Asked Deepening Gardner was understood to have contended that if the irrigation company would deepen its canal below the tail race, he could secure the needed increase in flow through his mill race without resorting to the water diversion which is now being attacked.

The complaint demands that Gardner be enjoined from opening the tail race banks to send the water back into the North Santiam river because, it is asserted, such diversion would rob the irrigation district below of its only available source of water. The development of 1200 acres of corn and beans under contract with canyons is endangered by the diversion, the plaintiffs aver.

Gardner's protest of a threatened water shortage was largely responsible for the Salem water department's investigation and finally developing its law under round water supply on Grayton Island. Gardner told city officials here he believed water from under the island could largely from springs and would not reduce the flow of the Santiam materially at his intake dam, which extends from the island to the mainland across the north channel of the river.

\$274,000,000 Bill In Lap of House

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experimental dirigible. The committee said the former could not be started until after May 1, 1939, and the latter would have no military value.

Apart from the naval funds, the major items in the bill were \$94,285,404 to restore the capital of the commodity credit corporation to \$100,000,000; \$49,561,886 to refund social security taxes to states which did not have unemployment compensation laws in effect prior to December 31, 1936, and \$50,000,000 for processing tax funds.

Shortly after the bill reached the house floor, Representative Taber (R-NY), ranking minority member of the appropriations committee, declared its enactment would bring the total appropriations for this session to almost \$13,500,000,000 and create a deficit of \$8,000,000,000 in the next fiscal year.

Daladier Orders To Down Raiders

FERPIGNAN, France, June 7.—(AP)—Premier Edouard Daladier completed an inspection of French defenses on the Spanish frontier today and ordered artillery and air forces to shoot down any planes which again threatened French territory.

The strength of France's land and air forces at southern centers like Tarbes and Montpellier within a few hours of the border is estimated at about 60,000 men.

Of these troops only a few thousand anti-aircraft and aviation units are actually within sight of the frontier where reinforcements were rushed after bombers of "unknown nationality" from Spain thrice attacked French communities.

To prevent repetitions the premier declared squadrons of French pursuit planes will guard the Spanish border region day and night.

The county fair board, desiring protection of a recreation center where exhibits are held, said animals could be stabled beneath streets and sidewalks which were raised on concrete foundations after a 1922 fire which destroyed the town.

Huge Clipper Ship Makes Test Flight

Martin clippers used on the orient run tomorrow in order to get the "feel" of the transoceanic flying ships and get some basis for comparison in later tests of the 72-passenger clipper here.

Wait 12 Hours

For 12 hours today Boeing officials and crew members awaited ideal weather conditions for the hop to Lake Washington, but when the wind showed no signs of letting up, they decided to take off. Originally intending to skim the salt waters of Puget Sound for a mile before lifting the huge plane with its 152-foot wingspread into the air, Pilot Allen gunned her nose upward after a 3,000-foot run at a speed of about 80 miles an hour.

The four 1,500-horsepower motors thundered their challenge to the 20-mile wind as the ship flew north toward Edmonds, then circled and went south of Seattle, vanishing into a sky grown murky and dull from forest fire smoke.

Later it reappeared over the city, headed over Lake Washington and came down perfectly on the beach, end of the lake, taxiing back to the Sand Point naval air station.

Douglas Ship Flown
SANTA MONICA, Calif., June 7.—(AP)—The giant Douglas DC-4, first four-motored commercial transport manufactured in the United States, was test flown for one and one half hours today. It took off from Clover field, Santa Monica, was flown over the greater part of Los Angeles, landed at Los Angeles' municipal airport, and returned to Clover field.

Carl Cover, the pilot, said the 65,000-pound, 42-passenger plane "handled beautifully." It was landed twice without any difficulty whatever on its novel tri-cycle landing gear, which it tucked under its wings while in flight.

Salem to Help in Raising Rice Fund

2000 Cities Join Plan to Relieve Hungry in Chinese Cities

Salem will participate along with 2000 other cities in the United States in a "bowl of rice party" the night of June 17 to raise funds for the relief of civilian victims of the war in China. H. E. Barker, who has been named local chairman, announced last night. Detailed plans for the affair will be announced within a few days.

Other members of the local committee are Mayor V. E. Kuhn, C. A. Sprague, Mrs. Hal D. Patton and Mrs. Phil E. Barrett.

Funds raised at these parties will be sent to the United Council for Civilian Relief in China, headed by Col. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., and by that organization to agencies for relief in China recognized by the American medical fraternity and American church mission boards, Barker has been advised.

To Sell Tickets

To create interest in the rice parties, ticket selling contests will be staged in each city by young women who will compete for the honor of being named "Miss Model America." The winner will not only serve as a model for a distinguished sculptor but also receive a free training course in modeling and a motion picture contract.

The local bowl of rice party committee will soon announce where entrants in the "Miss Model America" contest may secure entry blanks and tickets. The five selling the most tickets will appear at the rice party and the winner among them selected by applause. Her photograph and measurements will then be sent to the national committee of judges.

County Just one Big Weed Section

Marion county will be one big weed control district beginning June 16 under an order entered by the county court yesterday. The move obviates the necessity of farmers forming numerous small control units in order to receive federal land conservation benefits.

Creation of the single all-county district is permitted under the new weed law enacted by the last legislature. The local district will cover control only of thistle and morning glory. Farmers will be eligible to receive up to \$5 an acre for weed control if they are signed up with the federal conservation program and their farms pass four weed inspections during the coming season.

Such administration of the weed district as may be required probably will be handled out of the county agent's office.

Dr. William J. Kerr Gets Honors at Utah School
