Christian Convert To Speak Tonight

Rev. Harry Golding, Noted Jew, to Tell Why He Is Gospel Worker

Rev. Harry Golding, well known converted Jew, will speak at the First Christian church tonight at 7:45 o'clock.

Rev. Golding will tell why he became a Christian and will explain the situation of the Jews in the world, and especially in Palestine, in the light of Bible prophecy.

He was born in England of orthodox Jewish parents and attended the Jewish schools and studied Talmudism and Rabbinitism for his parents were anxious that he should become a rabbi. As Judaism did not satisfy him, he took up the study of agriculture and veterinary surgery. He traveled through Europe and finally came to Toronto, Canada, where he completed his studies at the university. Later he came to the United States where he became interested in the livestock industry.

He became an authority and was called as a judge to many livestock exhibitions.

However, he felt the need of a religion which would still his inner longing and accepted Christianity. After studying in the Bible institute at Cincinnati, Ohio, he became a minister of the gospel.

At present, Rev. Golding is affiliated with the First Hebrew Christian synagogue of Los Angeles. Dr. A. U. Michelson, founder and minister of the synagogue, has lectured here on various occasions.

Mrs. W. W. Elliott Dies, Rites Today

MONMOUTH—Mrs. William W. Elliott, 67, died Monday after a long period of ill health. Lucinda Doles was born May 24, 1871, in Adams county, Iowa. Five years later her parents moved to Melrose Lodge, Kansas.

In 1893 she was married to William W. Elliott and a short time afterward they moved to the Oklahoma Territory where they homesteaded land and made their home for 15 years.

In 1907 they made a trip to Oregon, spending six months at Sheridan. Returning to Kansas they went to Colorado Springs, Colo., for several years, then came to Oregon to establish a permanent home.

Surviving are her widower and one son, R. D. Elliott, both of Monmouth, and two grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock at the local Christian church with Rev. W. A. Elkins officiating. The Smith-Barrick mortuary is in charge of arrangements. Interment will be in Fir Crest cemetery here.

Birth Rate Rises Over Year Before

There has been a decided increase in births in Marion county for the first four months of this year as compared to the same period a year ago, according to the report released yesterday by the Marion county department of health. For January including April in 1938 there have been 433 births and in 1937 during the same period there were 339 births. For April of this year there were 122 births, 54 male and 68 female.

Ninety deaths occurred in the county during April of which 52 were male and 38 female. There were two infant deaths, 9 communicable disease deaths, 12 cancer, 6 diabetes, 7 apoplexy and 22 heart disease.

Communicable diseases in the county were not nearly as high for April as for a year ago. There were 28 cases of chickenpox, 10 influenza, 7 measles, 29 pneumonia, 3 scarlet fever and 5 tuberculosis.

Dependence of both wealth and intelligence upon transportation was emphasized by P. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, in a talk at the Salem Kiwanis club luncheon Tuesday noon.

Mr. Baldock traced the history of transportation from the period of the Roman road through the development of modern paving methods started by Macadam 100 years ago in England, and touched upon the development of motorized transportation and aviation.

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Sykes Finds Labor Act Is Disfavored

Talks Politics, Conditions With People Met on Eastern Jaunt

Discussing politics and "the good of the nation" with people everywhere along the southern route from California to Pontiac, Mich., and back by the southern route to Oregon, James Sykes, former Salem resident, found that most of them considered repeal of the Wagner labor relations act as the most essential step toward prosperity, he reported while visiting here.

General opinion favored freedom of labor to organize but also was in favor of curbs on picketing, prohibition of sit-down strikes, government arbitration of labor disputes, elimination of about half the present governmental agencies of all kinds, reduction of governmental expenses and monetary stabilization as other steps toward recovery, Mr. Sykes said.

Mr. and Mrs. Sykes left their home in Loma Linda, Calif., early in May and drove east through Arizona, Texas, Oklahoma and the middle west states, returning through Iowa, Nebraska, Wyoming, Idaho and Washington.

Martin Well Known
Everywhere they went, they found that Governor Charles H. Martin of Oregon was known, and that many people regretted his defeat in the primary election, Mr. Sykes said. This was particularly true in Michigan, since the governor of that state sided in with the sit-down strikers. Many people there indicated they would like to have a governor something like Martin, Mr. Sykes declared.

Mr. and Mrs. Sykes lived in Salem continuously from 1886 until about two years ago. For about 20 years he was connected with the C. K. Spaulding Logging company. He owns the Brookside auto camp north of town and a house in Salem. While in Pontiac, Mr. and Mrs. Sykes visited with Fred Kessling, formerly of Salem.
