Of course, there was no hesitation when it came to naming two of the flingers, Sangren and Jonas, but the third caused the veteran mentor to reflect a bit. The other two spots that caused momentary reflection before they were filled were third base and one outfield berth. At first prone to name Whitman's hot corner protector, Keene took a gander at his own third baseman's season average. Finding that Jolting Johnny Kolb had whaled the apple at a .340 season's rate despite going hitless the 17 times he appeared in the championship series, Keene gave the New Jersey freshman the nod. Though Buzz Hagedorn, batting average was but .266, "Spec" took into consideration Buzz' stellar defensive play, his unparalleled throwing arm and his hustling tactics when choosing him as the third outgardener.

CHICAGO, June 7—(P)—The Chicago Cubs stretched their lead over the New York Giants in the National league pennant race to a game and a half today by conquering the invaders, 4 to 2, in the first game of their important four-game series.

Behind the superb pitching of Bill Lee, who cnaiked up his sixth straight victory, the Cubs slammed Cliff Melton for a brace of home runs in the seventh inning to score three runs, a safe margin of victory.

Lee held the Giants to seven hits, including homers by Mel Ott and Jimmy Rippe, while the Cubs clouted Melton for nine safeties and got two more off of Dick Coffman, who pitched the last inning. Ott, first up in the fourth, drove a home run into the right field bleachers to end Lee's streak of 35 innings in which no runs had been scored off his delivery.

Shakeup Made For Open Play

14 Withdraw Including Al Espinosa; Weather Raw and Rainy

DENVER, June 7—(P)—The lineup for the 42nd national open golf championship underwent a shakeup today while fresh arguments developed over the hazards that seem calculated to discourage chances of another record-smashing tournament.

A total of 14 withdrawals was disclosed by Joseph Dey, executive secretary of the United States Golf association. The list, in addition to Eddie Held, Denver amateur, who also was disqualified for an infraction of the rules during the district qualifying tests, included such well known professionals as Al Espinosa, one time runner-up for the open crown, and Orville White of Greensboro, N.C.

So far, Dey said, 11 replacements have been named, with the probability that other substitutes will be found to produce a maximum starting field of 170 players for the first round Thursday.

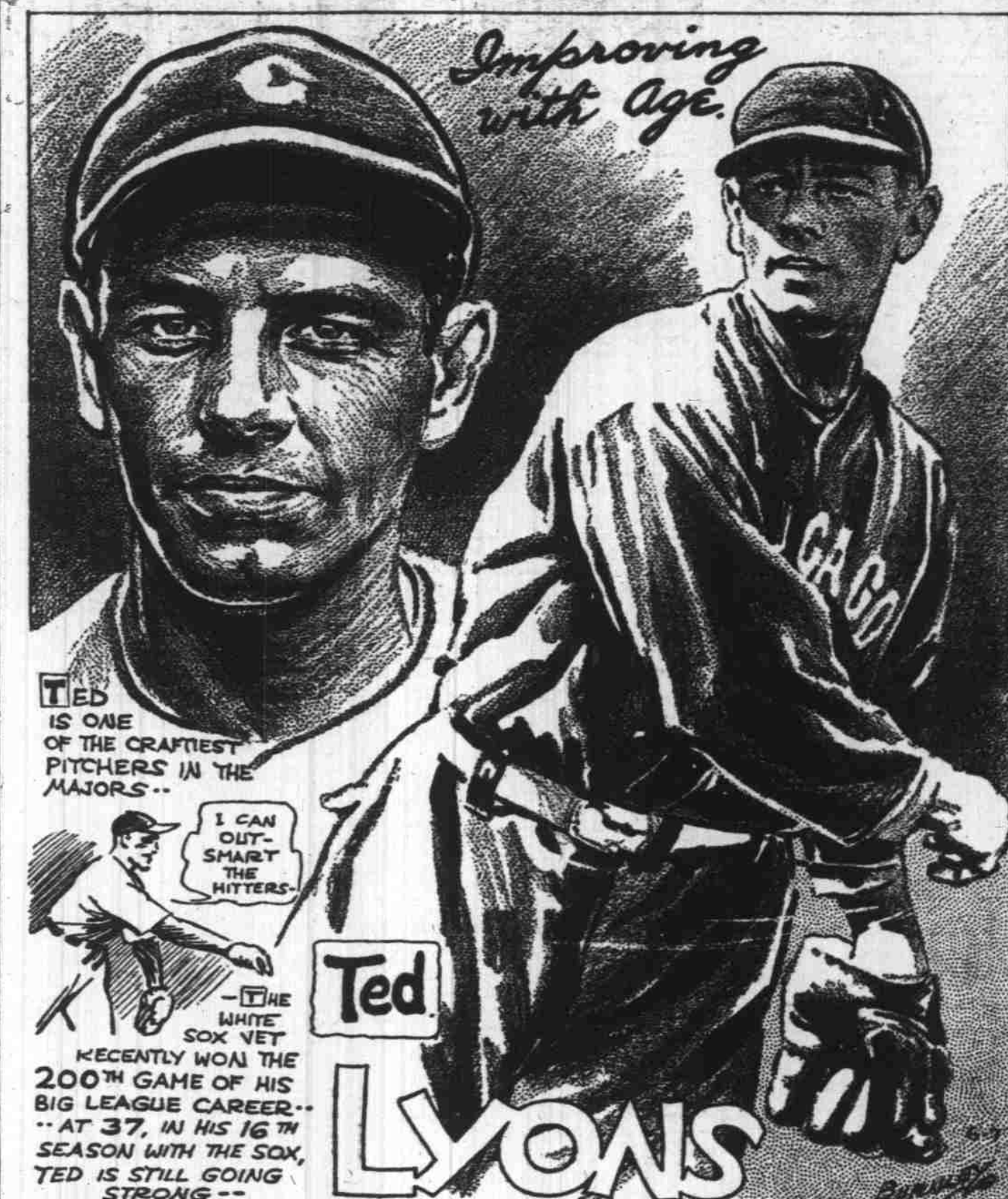

Perennial Pitcher of Pale Hose

TED IS ONE OF THE CRAFTIEST PITCHERS IN THE MAJORS—

PRACTICALLY A Chicago landmark, the veteran Ted Lyons has been toiling for the Windy City Sox for sixteen years.

Thin Theodore has never pitched for any other club, whether of the major or minor league variety. The great right-hander came to the White Sox direct from the campus of Baylor University, and has remained with them ever since.

The bronzed Texan is one of the really remarkable twirlers of modern baseball history. Recently he hung up the 200th victory of his mound career—a mark that mighty few boxmen ever reached in the big leagues.

During most of the years that he has hurled for them, the Chisox have been a mediocre club, but in spite of poor support Lyons has been a consistent winner.

This season, at 37, he is still one of the most dependable alingers on the Sox mound staff. Ted relies on his pitching wisdom and a knuckleball to fool the hitters these days.

He never regained his old speed since suffering from an arm ailment in 1929.

Ted is one of the few moundmen now performing under the Big Tent with a no-hit, no-run game to his credit. The Pale Hose perennial turned in his perfect effort back in 1926, when his luckless victims were the Boston Red Sox.

Another of his famous mound classics was a twenty-one inning epic against Cleveland in 1930.
