CORVALLIS, June 14.—(AP)—The Oregon Bankers' association closed its 33rd annual convention today with the election of O. A. Houghlum of Eugene as president to succeed C. E. Williamson of Albany.

A. K. Parker of La Grande became vice-president; J. B. Booth of Corvallis, treasurer; C. H. Stewart, Portland, chairman of the executive committee; C. B. Stephenson, Portland; C. M. Cox, Salem; C. E. Williamson, Albany; Al Powers, Pendleton, all members of the executive committee.

The group selected Booth as vice-president for Oregon for the American Bankers' association with Williamson as member of the executive council, E. P. Cramer, Grants Pass, member of the nominating committee, and George Brodie, Dufur, alternate on the nominating committee.

State divisional vice-presidents included Guy Hickok, Astoria, national banks; L. H. Alexander, Portland, savings; T. B. Garrison, Oakland, state banks, and Lorne Miller, Portland, trust.

The association approved a resolution recommending a uniform bank fees for the state but the details of the plan were not announced. Standing committees on agriculture, forestry, banking practice, standard forms, insurance and taxation.

Eight Die When Lightning Hits Army Bomber



A storm-battered U. S. Army bomber burst into flame and plunged into a field scattering the bodies of its stow-away crew of eight over rain-drenched prairie recently near Delavan, Ill. The ship, it was said, was struck by lightning before it crashed. The above photograph shows the wreckage. A farm boy witness reported that the ship exploded, bounced in the air and spewed bits of wreckage over a half mile area. The bomber was en route to Denver, Colo., from an army field at Rantoul, Ill.

California Pigeon Alights at Prison As Harbinger of Race Start Saturday

Apparently seeking to make Salem "pigeon-race-minded" for the 300-pigeon race to be started from here early next Saturday morning for the Golden Gate Racing Pigeon association of Oakland, Calif., a tired carrier pigeon Monday flew into the north cell block at the state penitentiary, Warden James Lewis reported.

On his right leg was a metal band labeled "AU-37-SJR-No. 187." A band on the left leg was inscribed "M880-JS Your club-1250 Alameda St., San Jose, Calif."

Warden Lewis said the club officials had been notified of the arrival of the pigeon at the prison. The bird was fed, given water and turned loose.

The Golden Gate club is sending about 300 pigeons here Thursday, to be released from the Railway Express office at 12th and Oak streets at 5:30 a. m. Saturday. The purpose is to see if any of the birds can make the 500-mile flight back to Oakland during daylight. Last year the weather was bad and a large number were never seen again.

Remind Students To Get SS Card

Those Taking Temporary or Permanent Summer Jobs Must File

Students who will enter commercial and industrial employment this summer were reminded by the social security board yesterday that they will need social security account numbers. Before beginning employment they should apply for a number at the Salem office of the board, room 200 postoffice building.

It is estimated by the federal office of education that this summer approximately 1,000,000 students may begin their business careers, or take a job during vacation. Students and teachers who work only during the summer also need account numbers.

Whether the employment is part-time, temporary, or permanent, and although the employer has no other employe, a report of the employe wages together with his account number must be made to the federal government by the employer, explained Ben O. Lipscomb, manager of the Salem office. The employe is required to report his account number to his employer.

All wages an employe receives during his entire life from employment covered under the old-age insurance system, Mr. Lipscomb explained, will be counted as credit toward his old-age insurance. Wages for temporary or part-time employment, no matter how small, will increase by that much the worker's credits toward his old-age benefits. It is therefore important to the employe that his wages reported by his employer be identified by an account number so that they will be correctly recorded in his old-age insurance account.

Grants Pass Man Held Polygamist

GRANTS PASS, June 14.—(AP)—A circuit court jury convicted Edward N. Santee, realtor, of polygamy today.

The state charged Santee married the late Irena Spencer Johnson while he was still married to Christina M. Santee of Kelso, Wash. Judge H. D. Norton refused to recognize the defendant's plea he was divorced in Mexico. Luvilla S. Santee, a former wife of the real estate dealer, died two years ago of a gunshot wound. Santee was also wounded. A grand jury said Mrs. Santee met death at the "hands of persons unknown."

This union which caused so much criticism throughout the nation threatens to go on the rocks. They have been so publicized and pursued by the curious that their existence has been far from normal. Neighbors describe their relationship as more that of father and daughter than man and wife. They live in isolated seclusion in a humble log cabin remote from any town and seldom go out. Eunice is described as a pretty little girl, now 11, who helps her mother-in-law, with whom the couple live, at the housework and sometimes gives her young husband a lift in the fields.
