

Cholera Adds To War Peril

Shanghai Municipal Body Says Dread Plague Rampant There

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Casualty and damage estimates were impossible to obtain because of disrupted communications in the area.

The floodwaters, fed by continuing rains, formed an ever-widening barrier between Japanese invaders and the North-South Peiping-Hankow railway, which crosses the Lunglai at Chengchow.

Chinese reported that the inundation from only one branch in the dike northwest of Chengchow plowed a southward course roughly paralleling the Peiping-Hankow and about 35 miles east of the right-of-way. This was approximately the path the raging river took in 1889, one of the nine times it changed its course.

Foreign military observers said that if the flood waters were charted correctly Japanese would be forced to detour to the south in their drive against the Peiping-Hankow or launch a new offensive southward from Shansi province.

Hundreds of farm families were said to have reached Chengchow and Kaileng, 43 miles to the east. Thousands were perched along the Lunglai right-of-way which stretches across Honan province plains.

Additional thousands were imperiled as the floodwaters surrounded or submerged northern villages.

The senate row centered upon a provision in the \$375,000,000 flood control bill authorizing the federal government to condemn land for flood-control projects, without the consent of the state in which the land is situated. Secondly a clause excusing the states from contributing to the cost of such projects was also in dispute.

Any question involving states' rights is always an invitation to oratory and this was no exception. The talking began last night with a speech by the fiery Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.). After he finished today, Senators Glass (D-Va.), Burke (D-Neb.) and King (D-Utah) attacked the bill.

Then, while the leadership looked disconsolately upon the first real evidence that a filibuster had to be dealt with, O'Mahoney began a second speech. But this time his remarks were brief. After five minutes he sat down and the flood control bill was rushed to a vote. It was approved 51 to 32, and the senate went on with the deficiency bill, passing it in short order.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(P)—The agriculture department reported today the nation's farm population on January 1 was the largest since 1910. It was estimated at 31,819,000, or 90,000 greater than a year earlier.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(P)—Senator Charles McNary, the republican leader, said today he would remain in Washington about a week after congressional adjournment to dispose of business and confer with party colleagues.
