Entries Come in For Polk County Lamb Show 18th

DALLAS—Entries for the first Polk county market lamb show have been coming in to the county agent's office this week in numbers which indicate considerable interest in the show and which indicate that this first undertaking will be a success.

This show is to be held in Monmouth on Saturday, June 18, beginning at 1:30 p.m. Lambs are to be brought to the show before noon, however, in order that a judging contest for 4H and Future Farmer members might be held.

A lamb carcass cutting demonstration has been arranged for as well as one on wool grading. Also, for the benefit of breeders there will be a demonstration on the administration of a method of treating sheep for worms using the liquid instead of capsules as had been customary heretofore.

This show is intended for market lambs only which will be classified as to either long wool breeds or medium wool breeds. Grade or cross breeds will be shown with purebred lambs and all entries judged together for there will be no special classification for 4H members and Future Farmers as they will compete with adult breeders.

Box Car Blown off Tracks by Texas Tornado



Following in the wake of the recent tornado which struck Clyde, Tex., seven victims were buried while the death toll rose to 14 as Mrs. J. H. Baxter, 75, and T. W. Briscoe, principal of school at Alyce, Tex., both died in a hospital at Abilene. Photo shows a box car which was blown 200 yards off the tracks as the "twister" passed squarely through the center of a 71-car freight train. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made for a transient identified as Allen Reynolds of Ranger, who died in the wreckage of a box car tossed to pieces by the tornado. The car was completely demolished.
