Runaways and Bicycle Accidents Feature Front Page News From Only Daily Edited at Silverton

SILVERTON—While no automobile wrecks were recorded at Silverton 37 years ago, record was made when "Uncle John Hicks met with quite an accident yesterday while driving across the bridge. One horse pressed the other off, and wagon, horses, man and all went over into the water and mud 12 feet below."

No airplanes fell from the sky, but "Miss Cora Neal was thrown from her bicycle, fracturing her skull and breaking a rib."

These records were made in Silverton's only daily newspaper, a small sheet published each day from June 13 to July 4, 1901. The old files came to light in the offices of J. E. Hosmer, now an attorney and real estate broker at Silverton, but then the publisher of "The Daily Appeal."

The old files show a versatile paper. For the sportsmen there are such items from "Henpeck Hollow":

Bag 10 Snipes "Joe Winters and Fred Van Gorder went snipe hunting Sunday. They only bagged 10 of those birds are not very plentiful in the mountains. . . . George Mais and Alfred Hult were out hunting wild cats Sunday. . . . Roy Russell caught 64 trout in the Abiqua one day this week and the next day his brother, Rex, caught 42 in Silver Creek."

Business competition was apparent at Silverton even 37 years ago, as such items will illustrate: "H. Heckmer of Salem is here with his peddlewagon selling heal soap, stereoscopes, views and Bibles. . . . Van Hooser, the liveryman, is out with a Sweet Candy man. The trip takes in Scotts Mills, Marquam, etc. . . . 50 pounds of prunes at Sather's for \$1. . . . Well arranged house and two lots near depot, for sale, \$700. . . . Near the Methodist church, house and 1 1/2 lots, good barn and other out-buildings \$700."

Social and club news records that "Miss Nina McNary, sister of Judge J. H. McNary, has returned to Salem. She has been visiting at the Mrs. J. H. Brooks' . . . Dr. Hugh Mount went to Salem Thursday. . . . Adda Wolford is noble grand of Tryphena Rebekahs and W. H. Drake is secretary. . . . George Riches is president of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union which meets 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month."

Fire Fourth Salute The 1901 Fourth of July celebration began with "Salute of 45 guns at sunrise," followed by a grand parade at 9:30 led by Silverton's marine band and directed by Marshal J. K. Mount. At 10 a. m. there were exercises at the Grove with Senator L. J. Adams giving the address. Rev. W. C. Kantner gave an oration, and Miss Stella I. Cranford read "The Declaration."

A "noon recess" was followed by a "Parade Extraordinary" directed by J. H. Buffe, a "Classical Cake Walk" on the "Grove dance floor" and other sports.

The Silverton and Hubbard baseball teams met on the "Nob Hill Park Baseball Grounds."

The city directory, printed in the paper, gave T. R. Hibbard as mayor; D. C. Kinny, S. Ames, H. Bock, P. W. Potter, W. F. Davenport, C. M. Hinkle as councilmen; W. Bowser as recorder, and chief of police was A. F. Simeral.
