Certification of Seeds Is Started

DALLAS - Seed certification season began this week for Polk county farmers with the field inspection for the certification of ryegrass. About 200 English acres of ryegrass were inspected for certification by Lawrence Jenkins, assistant farm crop specialist at Oregon State college, in cooperation with the Polk county agent's office.

The next inspections will be made in red clover and ladino clover plantings.

Growers who may wish to have certification inspections made should make application on blanks supplied through the county agent's office. Therefore all that is necessary is to write in and state what kind of seed is to be certified and request the neces-

sary blanks. The charges for certification vary on different crops but are nominal.
