

Gill Strikes at Labor Enemies

Grange Master Condemns Splitting of Labor and Agriculture

TILLAMOOK, June 21—(AP)—Ray W. Gill, state grange master, assailed "enemies" in a speech to the 36th annual convention of the state federation of labor for attempting to create a sharp division between agricultural and labor interests.

On the floor where yesterday resolutions were introduced condemning the Associated Farmers of Oregon, Gill declared that "during recent years certain groups of selfish or politically minded persons have schemed to create a feeling of distrust between farmers and laborers."

"They have sought to drive the wedge of hate between these two great groups," Gill said. "From the farmers side they have failed largely because the grange believes that problems that exist between the farmers and the laborers can be settled around the council table."

Cooperation Appreciated
"The grange appreciates the fine spirit of cooperation that has been manifested in the joint farm-labor relations committee as set up from members of your organization and members of our organizations acting as a joint committee."

"It is important that we maintain this friendly approach to each other and those forces that have tried to disturb such approaches have failed."

"I am glad to report to you that the Oregon grange session just closed went on record by a decisive vote in favor of continuing the policies that have been established in recent years regarding our labor relations and proposed legislation that would effect such relations."

A resolution pledging cooperation with the grange was adopted by the convention.

Tompkins Asks Unison
Morton Tompkins, grange overseer and chairman of the labor committee, contended that "the time has come for labor and farmers to see our problems in unison."

A speech by Henry L. Hess, democratic nominee for governor, was scheduled for Wednesday when Hess was unable to appear. Charles A. Sprague, republican nominee, also has been asked to speak tomorrow.

Before adjourning to attend a clam bake, action at the business session included:

Uniform state inspection for food handlers, the state to bear the cost; opposition to tax exempt bonds; income taxes for state and federal employees; rejection of Townsend plan endorsement.

Medford and Eugene were reported leading contenders for next year's convention.

At this point in Goebbels' speech a bellowing voice from the audience introduced the word "Sudenten," referring to the Germanic minority within Czechoslovakia. Goebbels took up the word.

"We won't tolerate any longer that 3,500,000 Germans (in Czechoslovakia) are being tormented. Austria has shown what could happen."

"All we want is peace, but not the peace of the graveyard."

The government minister's virulent attack came as the open campaign to drive some 500,000 Jews from Germany had shown signs of abating.

Dies Suddenly



Senator Royal S. Copeland, democrat of New York, died at his Washington hotel recently from "complications resulting from exhaustion," attending physicians said. The veteran lawmaker, nearing 70, was taken ill on the floor of the senate three days previously. During his last week he presided over nine meetings of conference committees on important bills.

State Gets Offer Of Elks Building

A group of Portland citizens, headed by Henry E. Reed, yesterday appeared before the state board of control and offered to sell the Elks building there to the state for \$690,000, including the Lincoln hotel property to the south, which would be used for parking purposes.

The owners would remodel the building to meet the state requirements and provide insurance for a period of 14 years.

Certificates of indebtedness would be accepted in payment for the structure.

This is one of approximately 40 proposals for a state office building in Portland now before the board of control.

Pair Bound Over On Assault Count

Wayne Cowden and Floyd Forrest Schaeffer were bound over to the grand jury on assault and battery charges yesterday after preliminary hearings in West Salem justice court yesterday. Judge Elmer D. Cook reported, and two other defendants in the same connection, Donald Bernard Allport and Ruth Marian Allport, were freed. The four had been charged with having beaten Charles A. Moyer, 70, of West Salem, Sunday during a disagreement over payment of rent.

Judge Cook released Schaeffer on his own recognizance but held Cowden in default of \$1000 bail.

US Forests Have Greater Variety Than in Europe

Forests of the United States are not only extensive, but they contain more varieties of trees than those of Europe, Lynn F. Cronmiller told members of the Salem Kiwanis club at their Tuesday noon luncheon. There are about 1200 species of trees in this country, of which 200 are commercially important, as compared to only about 150 varieties in Europe.

WPA Sewing Room To Be in Old High

The Salem school board and WPA officials yesterday reached an agreement whereby the WPA sewing room will be moved into the old high school gymnasium early next month. The school district will receive \$60 a month as remuneration for loss of the gym, used last winter for recreation projects, and the WPA will pay for lighting, heating and janitor expense.

The sewing room as well as the county relief offices are being removed from the Chambers building, 357 North High street, which they have occupied in part for four years.
