

Mott Returns From Capital

Says Valley Project Has Excellent Chance of Development

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and will join the group at San Diego for an inspection trip northward on the coast. The group will travel in the navy's largest transport plane and it will probably make a landing at the Salem airport. This probably will not be until September, since some of the members are busy campaigning in their home state primaries.

Admiral Leahy, chief of naval operations, has promised to appropriate a million dollar appropriation to start some activity at Tongue Point, the congressman said. There is also a prospect of establishment of three or four federal salmon hatcheries in Oregon to compensate for possible damage to the salmon supply at Bonneville dam, Mr. Mott reported.

Classification of the O&C grant lands under the new law drafted by Mr. Mott and Guy Cordon and passed during the recent session is getting under way, with prospects that the survey will be completed in time for the start of the next session so that Oregon counties will soon begin to derive revenue. The counties will receive nearly all of the proceeds of sales. A similar bill covering the Coos and Douglas county wagon road lands was started and has been reported favorably by committee. Roosevelt still has a bill.

Majority Oregon managed to get nearly everything it asked for in the 75th congress, Mr. Mott said. In the matter of national legislation he declared that President Roosevelt still controls his majority in congress and that it takes "something pretty bad" to stir up a majority against him as in the case of the reorganization bill. If congress had stayed in session a little longer that would have become a fact, he asserted.

Shortly after his arrival here, he received a telegram telling of Wednesday's PWA allotments, including the Linn county courthouse, a building for the state college at Corvallis, the Redwood high school and a bridge in Coos county. Mr. Mott will spend a few days at his farm near Salem, then go to Breitenbach for two weeks before starting his campaign for reelection. The two sessions of congress, starting last November, were extremely arduous, he reported. He said it was fortunate that the weather in the national capital was fairly cool until adjournment time, otherwise there would have been more than the two members' deaths which occurred at the close of the session.

At Nanking, John M. Allison, consul in charge of the United States embassy, made representations to Japanese regarding the slapping of J. C. Thompson of New Brunswick, N. J., by a Japanese sentry.

Doctor Thompson, connected with the American-owned Nanking university, was said to have been slapped while trying to prevent the sentry from beating Thompson's Japanese coolie.

Two American residents of Shanghai, F. W. Blackburn and J. D. Pate, were detained 40 minutes by Japanese at Garden Bridge, leading into the Japanese-occupied Hongkew section of Shanghai.

They were released after United States consular authorities investigated. The reason for their detention was not given.

Rotarians Speak Desire for Peace

SAN FRANCISCO, June 22—(AP)—Men from many nations stood before the International Rotary convention today and proclaimed the fervent desire of their countrymen for peace.

But no one spoke for Germany, Japan, Italy or Russia. The next party recently outlawed the Rotary clubs of Germany and Austria. Russia never has had a Rotary club. Premier Benito Mussolini has endorsed Rotary but that country was not represented.

There was a delegation from Japan but it did not participate in the peace talk that overshadowed all other subjects on the convention's international round table.

Jewry Condemned By Bund Director

PORTLAND, June 22—(AP)—Standing beneath the swastika symbol of the German-American Bund, Herman Schwinn, western director of the bund, exhorted Portland Germans tonight to join a "new war of independence" against "international Jewry" and communism.

Schwinn, whose booted storm troopers guarded entrances to the 4,500-seat hall, declared that the bund was a Nazi organization, declaring "the fatherland does not intend to give the blessings of her new national-socialist philosophy of government to this or any other nation."

Enemies of the bund in America, he termed supporters of communism, "a strictly kosher Jewish affair."

"The present Roosevelt administration is in all its high and low places infiltrated with red and pink Jews," Schwinn asserted, and declared that American labor unions were controlled by Jews who "receive instructions from Moscow."

There was no disturbance, and Schwinn's Nazi salute drew only a scattering response from his audience.

Unemployed Take \$1000 With Tags

VANCOUVER, June 22—(CP)—Spokesmen for Vancouver's militant unemployed announced more than \$1,000 had been collected in a tag day the jobsless held today, but that they had no new plans to announce "at present."

The tag day resulted in temporary arrest and jailing of 13 men, and a score more were picked up by police and taken to headquarters. Mayor George C. Miller announced early in the day that all "tin-canners" appearing on the street were to be arrested.

In Victoria Premier Pattullo reaffirmed his government did not intend to change its present stand—"no relief for men recently arrived from other parts of Canada."

Farmer Kills two Opposing Lawyers

LOS ANGELES, June 22—(AP)—Arthur Emil Hansen, 33-year-old Wakonda, S. D., farmer, shot and killed two lawyers who were opposing him in a civil case today in the hall of records.

Hansen's victims were J. Irving Hancock, 26, and Robert McLaughlin, 48.

"I regret nothing I did; I had nothing to lose," Hansen told Capt. William Penprase, sheriff's captain. "When I entered that courtroom and saw those two attorneys who had cheated me out of everything I owned, and who were whispering together to harm me further, I saw red. I'm glad they're dead; they can't hurt anybody else."

Captain Penprase said Hansen's confession to the shooting was made in a jury room a few doors away from the courtroom of Comm. Kurtz Kauffman, where Hancock and McLaughlin were shot.

Hansen won a judgment of \$7,000 several months ago. Subsequently, John Hancock, father of the slain attorney, won a judgment against Hansen and levied on Hansen's judgment.

Hancock slumped in his chair in the courtroom as a bullet penetrated his temple. McLaughlin sprawled to the floor.

Hansen was stopped after he had fled the room, but Captain Penprase said he readily admitted the shooting and handed over his pistol, which he carried in a specially-made silk pocket in the left side of his coat.

Wrong Resolution Roils Townsends

LOS ANGELES, June 22—(AP)—Angry opposition to a resolution opposing formation of a national Townsend political party, introduced by mistake, today threw into turmoil and confusion the third national convention.

Split into two camps on the issue, opposing leaders representing the 6,000 delegates by bitter protests forced withdrawal of the resolution for refraining.

Later, Convention Chairman L. W. Jeffery, national vice-president, explained "an error was made in presenting the resolution."

"It was rejected by the resolutions committee earlier in their consideration," he explained.

Some Townsends said they saw in the incident a possible "trial balloon" to learn the sentiment toward a national party.

Dr. Francis E. Townsend, founder of the \$200-a-month pension movement, is anxious to form a third party, but Townsends from the east and mid-west are said to believe the best interests of the program can be furthered by a neutral stand.

Earlier in the day, with few dissenting votes, pension plan supporters adopted a resolution assailing new deal policies.

No Lives Lost In Cloudburst

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struck, said water stood two feet deep in the main street before the cloudburst.

"We rushed up to the hill on the west side of town and . . . could see a torrent of water rushing down the east Birch creek channel," she said. "A three-room house was wrenched from its foundations and torn apart by the water after being carried about a block.

"The roar of the water was augmented by the crashing of debris against other buildings. The water engulfed a great deal of poultry and I saw two men recover a dead canary bird in a cage. A man, his wife and baby were rescued from their water-encircled home by two men in the only rowboat in town."

Mrs. Richardson said a second crest of the flood struck the village 20 minutes later, and the narrow East Birch creek channel rose about 12 feet above normal, spreading water five feet deep across the 300-yard valley.

She credited the telephoned warning with saving many lives.

HAYRE, Mont., June 22—(AP)—A flood following rain of cloudburst proportions tonight sent a wall of water five feet high through streets in the north-central Montana town of Hayre.

Florence Facey, city editor of the Hayre Daily News, said basements of business buildings and homes in an area two miles square were flooded.

Automobiles caught in the flood, she said, were floated three and four blocks away from parking places.

Bull creek, which drains the Bear Paw mountain area south-east of Hayre, was transformed into a raging torrent.

There was no loss of life reported, she added, although property damage would run into "thousands of dollars."

As far as could be learned immediately, Mrs. Facey said, the flood caused no appreciable damage to main-traveled highways or tracks of Great Northern railroad in the area.

Hayre has a population of slightly more than 6,000.

CORVALLIS, June 22—(AP)—Oregon State college prepared to launch a \$500,000 building program today when the PWA's approval of a loan and grant for a \$300,000 chemistry building.
