Exaggeration.

To date, however, no trace of the culprit who was responsible for the story has been found. The boss claims he knows nothing about it; the city editor disavows any knowledge; the proof reader begs innocence; the operators swear they followed copy to a split infinitive; and, of course, the sports editor wouldn't know anything about it. So, with due apologies to Mr. Shedeck and those championship Saints, reckon we'll have to charge it up to a gross exaggeration—a 22-point one as it were.

Kid Comers.

Coach Howard Maple has some likely looking youngsters in his Statesman-Legion gang that Tuesday night beat Corvallis, luckily, 12-11. Young Bower, the lad who last winter upset Leslies' apartment with a last-second basket for Parrish in a playoff game for the city basketball championship, plays a heads-up game at second base. Not yet large enough to really cut through with a swing at the plate, he nevertheless has a good eye and manages to push his share of hits through the infield. At field he not only figures the play ahead for himself but keeps his mates advised. Others who look to have possibilities include Eddie Salstrom, third base; Frankie Evans, about the most aggressive young ball player I ever saw, outfielder; Wilson, shortstop; and Rocque, the youngster who pitched Tuesday night.

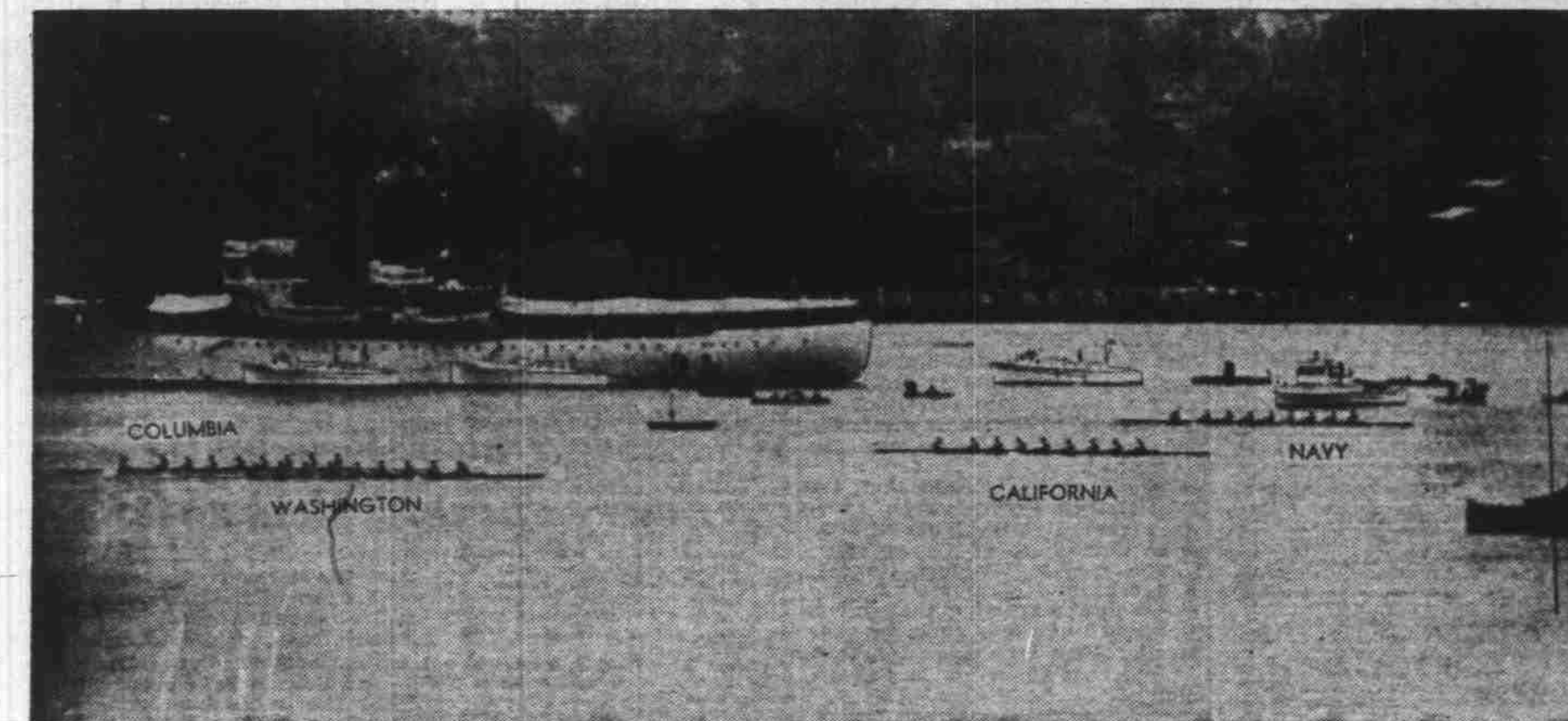
