

Blockade System May Be Extended

Coroner Setup Abolition
Also Recommended by
Coast Association

VANCOUVER, June 30—(AP)—Chief Constable W. W. Foster of the Vancouver police department today was elected president of the Pacific Coast International association of law enforcement officials as the association ended its three-day convention here.

Mexico City was chosen as the next convention city.

The association passed, without discussion, a resolution calling for perfection of a road blockade system to aid pursuit of criminals. They also asked the United States government to pass legislation which would help check transportation of worthless securities from one state to another for purposes of fraud.

Another resolution called for abolition of the coroner system to be replaced by an expert medical examination method.

FERA Liquidated As Time Runs out

Formerly Lusty Agency of
Relief Work Winds up
With Little Left

WASHINGTON, June 30—(AP)—A bookkeeper drew a double red line in a ledger in the WPA office here today, and the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, one of the oldest and richest agencies of the New Deal, gave up the ghost.

Its cash register once sang to the tune of \$1,000,000,000 per annum. But when its congressional lease on life ran out at the end of the fiscal year today its assets amounted to only \$250,000. This automatically goes to the treasury to pay any claims on the FERA estate.

FERA was born on May 22, 1933, when a young social worker from New York, Harry Hopkins, came to Washington and was made administrator of the new agency, which was to distribute federal funds to the states, chiefly for direct relief.

Burdette National Optometrist Head

6 Submarines to Be Built by Navy

WASHINGTON, June 30—(AP)—The navy arranged today for the construction of six submarines expected to cost a total of more than \$30,000,000 and to be completed about three years hence.

Assistant Secretary Charles Edlison assigned the task of building two of the ships to the Portsmouth, N. H., navy yard. He ordered the Mare Island, Calif., navy yard to build another, and contracted with the Electric Boat company, Groton, Conn., for three more. The contract price of the latter is \$3,667,000 each, subject to change due to variations in labor and material costs.

Heavy Fines Paid By Four Hunters

ST. HELENS, June 30—(AP)—Four Banks hunters were assessed fines of \$100 each by Justice of the Peace L. Puzey of Clatskanie on a charge of spotlighting and killing a yearling doe. They were Douglas A. Dreeszen, high school coach, Albert Sidney Heard, William J. Heard and George Kessler. In addition Justice Puzey ordered Albert Heard's two rifles confiscated.

Insurance Murder Charged to Three

WAYCROSS, Ga., June 30—(AP)—Solicitor Gen. John S. Gibson said today a father's confession disclosed the shooting of a 10-year-old boy as an "insurance killing" in which two women "drew straws" to determine the role of executioner.

The solicitor said the father, Harvey Nelson, roadhouse and filling station operator, named two employees, Verna Mae Fowler and Mary Kent, as fellow conspirators in a plot to collect \$300 from a policy on the life of his son, J. C. Nelson. The boy was shot to death on the porch of the father's place of business near here May 26.

Gibson said Nelson informed him the Fowler woman fired the shot, after drawing the long straw. All three, the solicitor added, are in jail charged with murder.

Students Live on \$15 Month, Claim

CORVALLIS, June 30—(AP)—Some 250 thrifty Oregon State students held living costs to \$15 a month each by "baching" during the school year, Mrs. Lulu Howard, employment and housing secretary, said. This is half the cost for students in regular living quarters.

She said that nearly 200 steady positions were available for the 1299 students who applied for work. Wages for all work totaled \$44,876.
