**Claims US Ahead
On War Aircraft**

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(AP)—The army, placing \$14,432,195 order today for 93 fighting planes, took occasion to proclaim that the United States is superior to the rest of the world in designing military aircraft.

The planes ordered included 13 "flying fortresses" such as flew in February to Buenos Aires and return, 75 small bombers and seven streamlined attack planes.

Louis Johnson, assistant secretary of war, asserted that the flying fortress, a huge bomber, is definite proof that America still maintains its position of leadership in aeronautical design.

Mountain Youths Shoot Fishermen "Without Malice"

FORT COLLINS, Colo., July 1.—(AP)—Two mountain boys were held today for juvenile authorities after they confessed, Sheriff Carl Gooch said, to shooting a man simply because they "wanted to kill a fisherman."

That and the statement "we're bandits" was their only explanation, the sheriff said. One boy is 13, the other 16. Under Colorado law the sheriff could not disclose their names.

The victim, Frank Parr, 56, of Fort Collins, was wounded while fishing yesterday. He is recovering.

**King Gray's Death
Indicated Murder**

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., July 1.—(AP)—The pistol bullet which killed King D. Gray, 52, movie cameraman, was fired at least a foot from his body, since his coat showed no traces of powder burns, Ray Pinker, police chemist, reported today.

"If it proves to be a murder," said Detective Capt. J. J. Jones, "I believe we will find jealousy was the cause."

Further evidence that Gray was slain was given by the fact a .32 caliber pistol shell but no weapon was found when his body was discovered slumped over the steering wheel of his automobile in front of the postoffice here yesterday. Three buttons had been torn from his shirt.

**Both Parties to

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 1.—(AP)—Normal Chamberlain and William Taylor agreed today they would have been better off if they had settled their dispute themselves.

Taylor told Municipal Judge C. C. Jacobs he struck Chamberlain on the jaw in an argument over use of a car.

Truce Decried in Portland Dispute

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1.—(AP)—A walkout of 200 Safeway Stores, Inc., clerks and a threatened sympathy strike of 600 warehouse workers was averted today when a truce was reached over inclusion of store managers in a union working agreement.

The walkout had been set for today. The dispute will be submitted to conference by the retail grocery clerks union and a personnel representative of the company who is due here Tuesday from Oakland, Calif.

Store spokesmen said the managers had signed a petition stating they did not wish union affiliation. The union claimed the managers had been influenced.

HOOD RIVER, July 1.—(AP)—A man's body washed ashore from the Columbia river near Mitchell Point today. Sheriff John Sheldrake said the victim was about 45 and wore a good quality brown suit bearing a Salem tailor's tag.

Sheldrake estimated the body had been in the water about a month.

Salem police were unable to find a record of any missing person answering the description of an unidentified man whose body came ashore near Mitchell Point on the Columbia river Friday morning.

**French and Turks
Pledge Friendship**

PARIS, July 1.—(AP)—France and Turkey clasped hands today in a good neighbor pact, concentrated in the sanjak of Alexandretta, which might change the political complexion of any new European war.

In addition to this treaty of friendship, which France will seek to broaden into a three-nation pact by negotiations with Syria, a military agreement was reached by which France and Turkey jointly guarantee the internal and external security of Alexandretta.

It was provided that from today equal numbers of Turkish and French troops would be stationed in Alexandretta, the 10,000-square mile district which formerly belonged to Turkey.

Leaders of Union**

Vanderveer, in a grilling cross-examination, asked Banks how it was that he never reformed until last month. Banks shouted back that he decided to "come clean" when he saw that he was "going to take the rap."

"Are you more honest than you were six months ago?" Vanderveer asked.

"Yes, I am because I've quit dealing with you fellows. You go out and protect the fellows—"

Banks answered, but he was interrupted.

"What dealings have you had with me?" Vanderveer questioned.

"None, thank goodness," Banks said.

Banks said that "Robison talked me out of telling all when I was sentenced. He swore on a stack of Bibles that he would help me. He promised that my wife would be taken care of. I was figured as the payoff man."

Banks' wife was paid \$20 every Saturday by Robison, Banks said, but there were no checks after he was sentenced.

Vanderveer failed to draw an admission from Banks that he was promised a pardon if he would implicate Rosser, but Banks did say that he "would do almost anything to get a pardon."

**Telephone Slips,
Checks Are Shown**

Hayer introduced in evidence the checks made out to Banks by the Salem local allegedly to pay the firebugs, and telephone slips showing that Banks and Rosser made several calls to each other about the time of the fire. The slips were identified by George Anderson of Portland, telephone company special agent.

Dorothy Lipps, 22, pretty secretary to Banks, corroborated part of Banks' testimony relating to the checks. John Newlands took the stand shortly before adjournment and will resume when court convenes at 9:30 a.m. tomorrow.

Newlands, under examination by Ralph Moody, special prosecutor appointed by Governor Martin to assist in labor vandalism trials, said that Moore, although a member of the teamsters union, never had driven a truck.

Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker said the Saturday session would last all day.

**Removing Private
Supply Is Advised**

A resolution advising the state board of control to remove from state buildings all piping from the penitentiary or other private water supply sources was adopted by the Salem water commission last night as an outgrowth of the recent dispute over the sudden appearance of sediment-filled water in the office building and new capitol.

The resolution declared a cross-connection between city and pen system water lines had been discovered and pointed out that such a condition gave threat of contamination affecting not only state employees but also citizens of the city in general.

Removal of private system piping from the buildings was advised by the resolution as a measure to prevent possible mistakes being made by plumbers and other workmen.

you from the bottom of our hearts."

The painful journey marked the close of an intensive eight-day search that started June 23 when he disappeared on a mountain climbing expedition with Richard Whitmer, 20-year-old Princeton student and son of a late wealthy Albuquerque lumberman.

Both boys apparently fell from the sheer heights of Sandia peak, McCormick on one side and Whitmer on the other. Whitmer's body was found a week ago today, broken on the rocks under the west cliff of the peak.

Late yesterday, a party of Sandia Indians located McCormick's body high on the northeast face of the peak, opposite the spot where Whitmer's body was found and hidden from the search of hundreds of men who combed the western half of the mountainside for days.

**Control of Coast
Battle Objective**

HENDAYE, France (at the Spanish Frontier), July 1.—(AP)—Battle for control of Spain's rich eastern coast developed in intensity tonight with insurgents hammering their way through Bochi village just south of the Mijares river.

Insurgent dispatches said their forces swept government defenders from strong fortifications on the nearby slopes of Mount Ester and Solach.

It states, shows that cost of the project as originally set up will also cover the demolition job.

The architects retained last fall have been instructed to prepare working drawings and specifications for the demolition of the old building, the letter adds. They will not be paid for the additional work unless the voters approve the new courthouse proposal and then only under the percentage contract as it now exists. The architects were paid \$1000 last year for preliminary plans under agreement they should be retained on specific terms in case the county decided to proceed further.

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
