Appliance Men Organize Here

Power Company to Assist; Retiring From Most Sales Fields

An organization to be known as the Willamette Valley Electric Appliance Dealers' Cooperative association was formed Friday night at a meeting of electric appliance dealers held at the Golden Pheasant restaurant.

The prime purpose of the formation of this organization is to bring together electric appliance dealers in Salem and vicinity into a unit of organization that can effectively cooperate with the Portland General Electric company in its new plan of cooperative merchandising of electric appliances.

Officials of the company present at the meeting announced to the dealers present that the company had on July 1 in Salem and vicinity ceased all merchandising, or the sale of, all electric appliances except ranges, water heaters, space heaters, and refrigerators, and would cease the sale of refrigerators as soon as the company's limited stock was exhausted, and would automatically cease the sale of these items and maintain or improve the volume of sales now being made jointly by the company and the dealers.

Policy Explained
The company officials explained that all electric power companies had found it necessary, in the introductory and development period of electric appliances, to merchandise and sell the same because there was not sufficient general acceptance of these appliances on the part of the public to justify dealers in spending sufficient money to promote the sale of the appliances to rapidly create a widespread use of much equipment which was essential to the power companies, in order that sales of electricity might be increased and, in turn, reduce their costs per kilowatt hour and again in turn make possible reduction in rates.

The company officials stated that they believed that there was now sufficient general acceptance of such appliances to enable the electrical dealers to carry on the merchandising of such equipment under a cooperative plan with the power company so that there would be no diminution in volume of sales or service to the public in the latter's interest if the company ceased to merchandise appliances as above mentioned.

The dealers were told that the company would be glad to receive and, in fact, requested suggestions from the dealers' association as to how, in the judgment of the dealers, the company could best cooperate with them in their electrical merchandising activity.

Johnson Mill not To Resume Today

Will Operate Only Enough to Cut Power Fuel, Is Announcement now

TOLEDO, July 4.—(AP)—The management of the big C. D. Johnson lumber mill said today that it would not resume operations tomorrow, as previously planned, but would continue to operate periodically to cut fuel for the power plant and finish incomplete orders on file.

The camp on the Siletz river and several small "gyppo" logging outfits in the Siletz forest also will be affected. Representatives of the Industrial Employees' union, which includes most of the 500 men in the sawmill, had been negotiating to a settlement of a wage controversy which arose when the company offered a 15 per cent wage cut as the alternative to partial employment. Union officials, declining to make any statement on negotiations, said no settlement had been reached.

The employees voted almost unanimously to refuse the cut and later agreed to negotiate. The mill furnishes power for most of the Lincoln county coast and the Toledo area and thus is required to continue operations sufficient to provide this service.

Six Killed When Train Hits Auto

QUAKERTOWN, Pa., July 4.—(AP)—Six persons, members of one family, were killed Saturday when their automobile was demolished by a high speed electric trolley near here.

Lieut. F. C. Minor of the state police tentatively identified the dead as: John B. Johnson, about 47, of Franklin, Pa.; Mrs. Grace Johnson, his wife. Aileen Johnson, 13; Mary Johnson, 22, daughters. Mary Brennan, 20, a cousin who resided with the Johnsons. Miss Aileen Gallagher, 22, of Philadelphia.

The automobile was carried nearly 500 yards by the trolley, witnesses said.

Umpqua River Project Eyed

Extension of South Jetty Approved; Survey of Navigation Looms

By JOHN L. WHEELER WASHINGTON, July 5.—(AP)—The growing importance of the picturesque Umpqua river as an outlet for southwestern Oregon commerce has caused army engineers to devote more and more attention to improvement of the stream.

At Reedsport once a bustling little seaport, with vessels making regular stops to load lumber and other products of the region, ocean traffic dropped with the passing of the schooner.

Now, residents of the community are looking forward to a revival of trade. They even expect to see considerable shipping on the stream far above the town.

The war department has set aside \$280,000 for extension of the south jetty at the mouth of the Umpqua, and stream surveys have been authorized from Scottsburg to Roseburg.

The last rivers and harbors act also authorized channel improvement in the river to a point 2.3 miles south of the mouth of the Pacific railroad bridge. The project, costing an estimated \$273,000, would include a channel 200 feet wide and 22 feet deep at low water, and a turning basin. Funds must be appropriated for the work.

The act also authorizes a survey which would review previous reports on the possibility of developing navigation facilities in conjunction with power development, flood control and navigation.

Want Early Test, Picket Ordinance

PENDLETON, July 4.—(AP)—Police Judge Charles E. Burnett said today he would order the trial of James Beck to test a newly enacted picket-regulating ordinance as soon as counsel was obtained to defend him.

Beck was arrested Saturday, less than 24 hours after the city council passed an emergency ordinance requiring pickets to be licensed. Beck was picketing a grocery store. The International Retail Clerks' union, which Beck represented, said it would challenge the ordinance on the grounds it was unconstitutional.

A similar ordinance is in effect at Eugene.

Seven Injured in Accidents, Eugene

EUGENE, July 4.—(AP)—Fourth of July casualties, all the result of traffic mishaps, put seven persons in hospitals here, among them two persons who tried to scale Skinner Butte in an automobile.

A police report said Jack Hendricks, Eugene, and a companion tried driving up down the precipitous face of Skinner Butte, long a city landmark. On one trip, the machine plunged out of control and turned over three times. Hendricks escaped with a broken ankle.

Angberg was found wandering about the city and was arrested on a drunk charge. After being placed in a cell, a jailer noted he appeared to be in a coma and had him transferred to a hospital, where surgeons operated in an effort to save his life.

How he received the injury remained unknown.

Boy Dies, 17 Hurt In Race Disaster

Locked Wheels Make Cars Plunge Into Crowd at New Jersey Track

HO-HO-KUS, N. J., July 4.—(AP)—A 10-year-old boy was killed and 17 persons, all spectators, injured today when two automobile racers locked wheels and plunged into the infield crowd at the Ho-Ho-Kus speedway's holiday races.

The boy, who died shortly after being admitted to Hackensack hospital, was identified by Patrolman Frank Mortimer of Ho-Ho-Kus as Peter Thompson, 10, of Ridgewood, N. J. The boy's father, David, was in the same hospital in a critical condition.

The accident occurred as Fritz Brehm of Bayonne, N. J., and Henry Guerard of Newark, N. J., approached the starting flag ninth and tenth positions for the start of the 30-lap, 15-mile main event.

Rear Wheels Locked
Police Chief John A. McElroy said the rear wheels locked near the starter, Francis Fanning of West Orange, and both cars swerved toward him. Fanning was thrown five feet into the air and landed on the track.

The cars, still locked, broke through the infield guard rail and ran wildly into the crowd. Spectators in the grandstand gasped as bodies were hurled about. Neither driver was hurt.

Ambulances took six persons including the boy, to Hackensack hospital, and two others, including Fanning, to Paterson General hospital. He suffered a fractured leg.

Films on Erosion To Be at Stayton

"Exceptional" Rating Is Given "The River," Set for July 6 and 7

Civic, rural and educational groups as well as other agencies interested in conservation of natural resources should not fail to see "The River," dramatic documentary film produced by the farm security administration, USDA, and scheduled to be shown at the Star theatre, Stayton, July 6 and 7, announces T. R. Hobart, county rehabilitation supervisor, Stayton.

Leading national magazines have acclaimed the picture as one of the most important films of the season and the coveted rating of "exceptional" has been awarded it by the national board of review.

The picture films the life of the Mississippi, beginning with towering timber, building of cities, cutting of the forests and destructive erosion. It is climaxed with actual scenes of the devastating Ohio-Mississippi valley floods of 1937.

Remedies Depicted
Ending with an encouraging note, "The River" shows how man is attempting to remedy misdeeds of the past through foresting the worn-out hills, checking erosion, providing against future floods, setting up regional planning and extending farm aid through government services.

"The River" is the creation of Pare Lorentz who made "The Plow That Broke the Plains," which won international acceptance and led to the government's action in sponsoring the second film.

Virgil Thompson, modern composer, wrote the musical score which utilizes folk tunes, hymns and special sound effects.

Commercial distribution of the film is being handled by Paramount Pictures, Inc., in cooperation with the United States department of agriculture.

Happy Camp Road Program Boosted

GRANTS PASS, July 4.—(AP)—The Grants Pass and Illinois Valley chambers of commerce will participate in a good-will caravan to Siskiyou county, Calif., July 10 to strengthen interstate trade relations and ask the forest service to improve a mountain road to Happy camp.

A Crescent City caravan will support action on the road from the north. The plans for the caravan were announced to coincide with a statement from James Davis, Siskiyou county attorney, urging a California route from the interior to the sea along the Klamath river to avoid the necessity of going through Oregon.

His plea was reminiscent of a petition signed by 10,000 persons here three years ago asking a federal military road along the Rogue river to divert traffic from the California "bug stations."

Those arranging the program included Mrs. Ruth Norris, J. Papkoff, S. P. Dodge, Miss Maude Lippe and Mr. Davidson. William Taylor of Silverton also assisted locally.
