Beware of Gifts, Warns R. Holman

Monmouth People Hear State Treasurer Speak at Champoe

MONMOUTH—A number of Monmouth folks attended the 4th of July picnic and program sponsored by the sons and daughters of Oregon pioneers at Champoe, Monday. Harvey G. Starkweather acted as master of ceremonies. A musical number, "Oregon," was enjoyed; also music of the pioneer days presented by two elderly men, accompanied by Miss Isa Botten.

Charles Colwell read the Declaration of Independence, giving an unusually interesting interpretation. He stated that 36 years ago he had read it in Alaska, north of the Arctic circle, probably the farthest point north it had ever been presented.

The principal talk of the day was given by Rufus T. Holman, state treasurer and republican nominee for United States senator. The theme of his message was "Beware of Gifts." In part he said that as a people we should beware of gifts and be not anxious to take something for nothing, because our children may have to pay. Be independent. Don't sell your birthright. Beware of giving up local government. Preserve your rights.

"Laxity Spending Doomed" "History teaches us to remember Rome with its free games and gifts. There the man who gave the most to the people became the popular lion of the day. But how did it end? Disastrously," he continued.

"What is the territorial motto of Oregon? 'She flies with her own wings.' Let us never forget that. An honest man is the noblest work of God. Thrift is the keynote of prosperity. A nation that spends more money than it takes in is doomed to bankruptcy—and so is an individual."

Incidental mention was made of a cut in interest for the state of Oregon's indebtedness amounting to \$125,000 a year, achieved in recent years by thriftily cutting down expenses.

Riches Reunion Is Next Sunday
