National Calls On Youngsters

Only Two From Last Year Remain; American to Keep old Timers

CINCINNATI, July 5.—(AP)—The much-maligned National league's baseball forces, victims of American league powerhouse methods on most fronts for more years than they like to remember, will put their hopes for an all-star comeback tomorrow upon a talented but comparatively young and inexperienced cast.

Gambling on new blood to turn the tables, after defeat in four of five previous all-star matches, the Nationals will take the field against their favored foes at 1:30 p. m. (EST) before a capacity gallery of 28,000 fans at Crosley field, home grounds of the Reds.

Lefties to Start
Young Johnny Vander Meer, Cincinnati's southpaw hero of two successive no-hit pitching performances this season, who never has seen an all-star contest, will start against the veteran Vernon Gomez, Yankee lefty who has hurled in all four of the Americans' victorious games and been credited personally with triumphs in three of them.

Only two survivors of the National league's 1937 starting array, Second Baseman Billy Herman of the Cubs and Outfielder Joe Medwick of the Cardinals, will be in tomorrow's initial cast, whereas six of the nine American leaguers nominated for this year's batting order figured in the rout of the Nationals at Washington last summer.

Four of the Nationals, all representing the home-town Reds, will make their all-star debut as starters, while the Americans will unveil only two newcomers, John "Buddy" Lewis of Washington at third base, instead of New York's Red Rolfe, and Mike Kreevich of the White Sox in left field.

No Jinx Recognized
These comparisons may not mean the payoff. Fresh talent, minus any inferiority complex, may help the Nationals register a reversal of form. Notwithstanding the obvious uncertainties, betting men in the region of Cincinnati tonight quoted 8 to 5 against the chances of a National league victory. Odds of 10 to 13 were quoted against the power-plus Americans.

NEW YORK, July 5—(AP)—Here it is the day after the fourth and last of the turf championships has been decided.

In contrast, by this time last year, War Admiral had won the three-year-old crown and gone into temporary retirement, Seabiscuit had earned acclaim as the best of the handicap division, and the ranking two-year-olds had received notice of what to expect in their late season specials.

This year it is entirely different. The Admiral and Seabiscuit both have gone down after weeping the fans guessing as to when and where they intended to race. With the exception of Lawrin, the three-year-olds have beaten each other regularly while the top notch two-year-olds have yet to be tested.

The Admiral chalked up four straight victories, including the Widener challenge cup, before he finished out of the money in the Massachusetts handicap for the first time in his career.

Big Development Of Power Talked

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5—(AP)—C. L. Grimm, head of the division office of United States army engineers, told the institute on northwest affairs tonight that the Pacific northwest had developed only eight per cent of its water power resources, compared with 30 per cent in other sections.

Grimm said, however, that power possibilities of the northwest dwarfed those of other areas with Bonneville dam potentially capable of producing four times more power than the St. Lawrence river, 10 times that of the Tennessee and 20 times that of the Colorado river at Boulder dam.

Frank A. Banks, Grand Coulee dam supervising engineer, said construction of a series of 10 dams on the Columbia would utilize 92 per cent of the river's fall.

Yarnell Regrets He Can't Aid in Berthing Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5—(AP)—Admiral H. E. Yarnell, a junior officer on the Battleship Oregon when it made its historic sail around the Horn in 1898, forwarded regrets today because he would be unable to attend the national encampment of the United Spanish war veterans and the moving of the Oregon to a permanent berth here in September.

Swim Program Launched Here

150 Enroll on First Day; Room for Many More; Awards Arranged

Small enrollment, 150, marked yesterday's opening of the annual Red Cross-backed swim campaign conducted under Salem playgrounds supervision, and there is ample room in all classes for persons wishing to join the free "learn to swim" campaign, according to Director Vern Gilmore.

Awards will be given by Red Cross to all persons passing the required tests on the last two days of the campaign. They include: Beginners award, given to those able to jump into deep water and swim 25 feet; swimmers pin, awarded to those able to swim 100 yards, surface dive in deep water to recover underwater objects, swim on the back without use of the hands, float motionlessly for 30 seconds and witness demonstration of artificial respiration.

Junior and senior life saving is being taught. Junior life saving comprises methods of life saving, artificial respiration and water safety and senior life saving entails breaking holds by the rescuer applied by victims of accidents, water safety, carries used to take a drowning victim to safety, artificial respiration treatment for shock and approaches to a drowning person while making a rescue.

Fallon Leads in British Tourney

SANDWICH, Eng., July 5—(AP)—Johnny Fallon, 25-year-old Scottish internationalist, today took a one-stroke lead over defending champion Henry Cotton in the 36-hole qualifying round for the British open golf championship. Drenched and buffeted by a storm early in the day, Cotton beat par by a stroke at Prince's course with a 71 for 143, while Fallon, who went out after the storm had died away, shot a 72 over the same course to add to the 69 he posted yesterday at St. George's.

Cotton three-putted the sixth and seventh green but otherwise played faultless golf.

Clemency Given, Scottsboro Case

MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 5—(AP)—Alabama erased the death penalty from the Scottsboro rape case records today.

Gov. Bibb Graves commuted to life imprisonment the electrocution sentence against Clarence Norris, last of the nine original negro defendants to face the chair on conviction of ravishing two young white women on a freight train seven years ago.

The United States supreme court twice saved the negroes from death, by sending the case back to Alabama courts.

Three "Scottsboro" defendants now are serving long prison terms, for the alleged mass rape, and a fifth is under 20-year sentence imposed when he pleaded guilty, during new trials last year at Decatur, to assaulting an officer in an escape attempt.

Bank Deposits up Since March Call

Portland, July 5—(AP)—Deposits in the seven Portland banks totaled \$242,903,062 for the June 30 bank call compared with \$241,691,398 for the March 7 call.

The all-time high for all local banks was \$247,988,262 on December 31, 1937.

The United States National bank deposits were \$112,914,392 compared with \$120,067,000 on March 7 and the First National bank deposits were \$100,558,756 compared with \$98,503,977.

Galento May Get Scrap With Louis

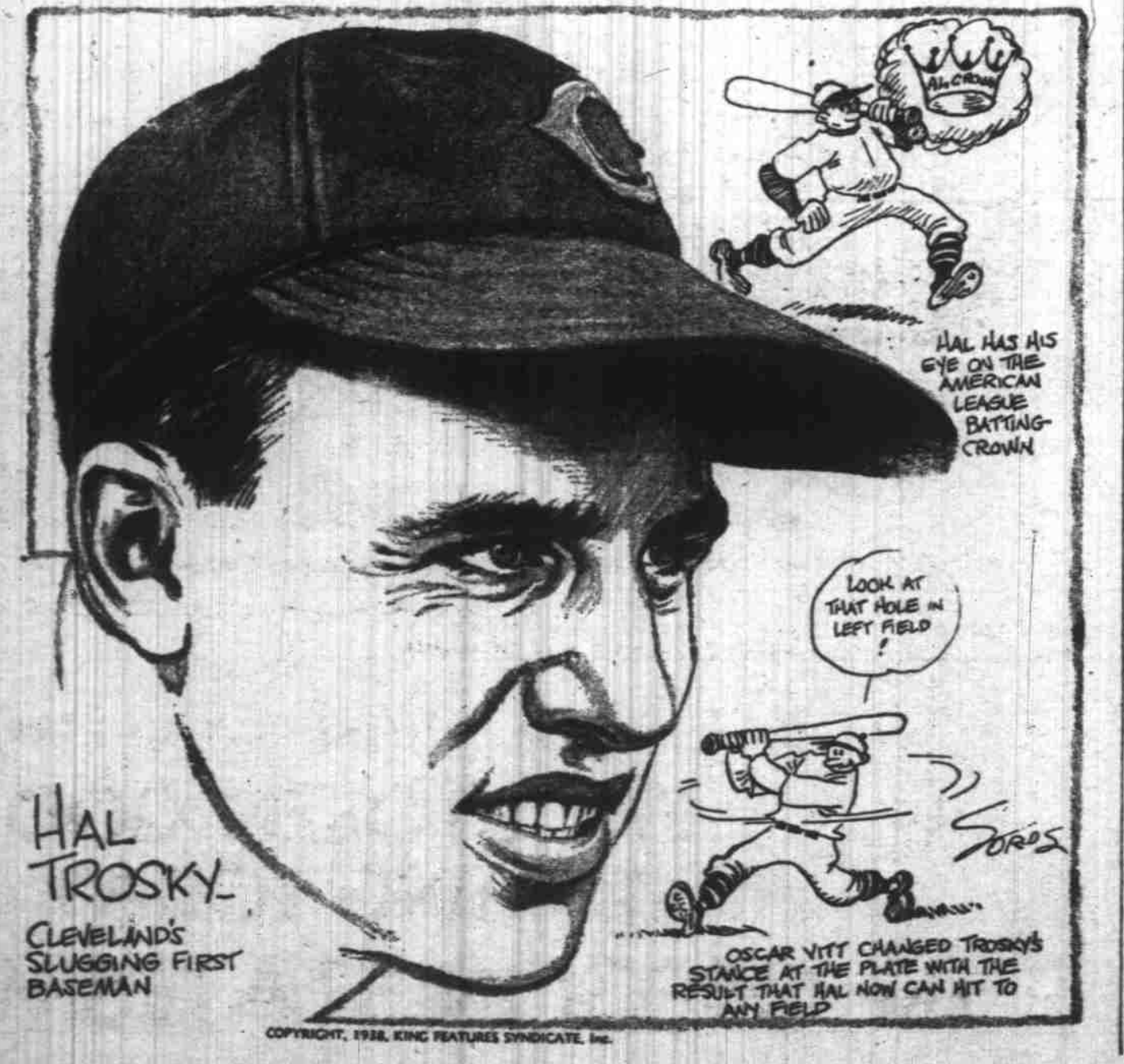
