Lebanon Council Approves Resurfacing Academy Thoroughfare

The council voted to purchase fine crushed rock for resurfacing of Academy street south of the high school.

The building committee reported repair permits to the amount of \$720.

The street committee reported contract for sewer on Eaton street had been awarded to Carl B. Jenkins for \$320.

The street superintendent was voted a two weeks vacation with pay.

Science Threatens Goldbeaters

Science threatens to leave the goldbeater shorn of his historic and traditional trade. The delicate art of hammering out small ingots into gold leaf 250,000th of an inch in thickness has long been done by hand. Heretofore no machine has been devised capable of duplicating the fine craftsmanship of the goldbeater, but now an automatic hammer of uncanny precision threatens to revolutionize the industry. Brooklyn, N. Y., is the center of the U. S. gold leaf business which supplies artists, bookbinders and painters with gold tissue for decorative purposes. But this ancient craft is on the way to being mechanized and the goldbeater appears destined to become as obsolete as the old-time blacksmith.

Crop Insurance On Polk Wheat Available in '39

DALLAS—Federal crop insurance for wheat will be available for Polk county growers on wheat seeded for the 1939 harvest, states Bert Caster, Polk county agricultural conservation association.

This insurance covers practically all crops risks such as drought, winter kill, fire, Hessian fly, and plant diseases. The premium on the insurance is figured in terms of bushels of wheat but may be paid in cash

at the current wheat prices. The average insurance rate for Polk county is 1.1 bushel per acre for 75 percent coverage and .4 bushel per acre for 50 percent coverage.

Wheat insurance is expected to interest quite a number of wheat farmers in the county. The county agent's office is prepared to give out detailed information to anyone desiring it.
