

Arabs Massed In Holy Land

Britain Speeds Warships and Troops to Smash Bloody Outbreak

JERUSALEM, July 7-(AP)—Arab tribes from Trans-Jordan were reported massed on the Palestine frontier tonight as British speed warships and troops to smash the bloodiest Jewish-Arab race outbreak in the Holy Land's recent history.

Simultaneously, Jewish leaders warned their people against being "drawn into civil war."

In a pitched battle lasting four hours British troops fought a band of 600 Arabs said to have just crossed the border from Trans-Jordan, east of Palestine and part of Britain's Palestine mandate but governed by a local Arab administration.

Report Five Killed

Five Arabs were reported killed and eight wounded. There were no British casualties.

Total casualties in two days of rioting and battling were 33 killed, 111 wounded.

However, a number of Arabs were said to have succeeded in entering Palestine and to have joined their comrades in the hills fighting for "Arab independence."

The tribesmen were said to be massing south of "Tegart's wall," the \$500,000 electrified fence recently completed along the Syrian border, north of Palestine, to keep trouble-makers out of the country.

The news of Arab reinforcements was received as Britain ordered two battalions of troops, each normally consisting of more than 500 men, from Egypt at "the earliest possible date."

Cruisers at Haifa

Already at Haifa were the British cruisers Emerald and Enterprise, each of more than 7,500 tons. Both arrived as the result of an emergency call.

En route to the scene was the mighty 32,000-ton cruiser Repulse, detached from its Mediterranean patrol duties at Malta to relieve the Emerald whose homeward journey from the East Indies was interrupted by the summons for reinforcements.

Violence in Palestine continued despite a constant patrol by troops and police.

Since the first of the year nearly 300 lives have been lost and hundreds wounded in bombings, ambushes and pitched battles.

Gaspar G. Bacon, former lieutenant governor, former president of the state senate and an unsuccessful candidate for governor, will be a classmate of Hatfield, treasurer of Middlesex county, former member of the republican state committee and former mayor of Newton.

Berlin Blats Say Webfeet Ignorant

EUGENE, July 7-(AP)—University of Oregon got a sample of Nazi propaganda recently in the shape of a photograph of its football team in a Berlin newspaper. The caption read:

"Who knows where these stars were found? Many a football player in the American universities cannot even write his own name."

An article in an eastern newspaper explained the photograph as part of the Nazi propaganda program intended to display the superiority of German education.

WASHINGTON, July 7-(AP)—Postmaster General Farley estimated that postal earnings for the 12-month period ending last June 30 were the highest in postoffice department history.

The earnings, he said in a statement, were "slightly larger" than the \$726,000,000 recorded in the fiscal year 1937.

Chicken Diseases Numerous, Claim

NEW YORK, July 7-(AP)—Among the 600,000,000 chickens scratching about the country's farms, there are diseases as numerous and as complicated as those afflicting man himself, Dr. F. R. Beaudette of Rutgers university, New Brunswick, N. J., told the American Veterinary Medical association today.

But, he added, as a food-producing animal the chicken has practically no disease transmissible to man, and the egg is the only food of animal origin which without sterilization or processing is germ-free.

Holland Winner In Vermin Drive

SCIO—At the conclusion of the recent vermin control campaign sponsored here by R. M. Cain in connection with the movement on an extensive scale elsewhere, Glen Holland was awarded a new rifle. Activities in the Scio community were limited chiefly to grey diggers, gophers, hawks and crows.

Holland exterminated 262 diggers, Faye Pettit 255, and Haman Shelton 118, most of these being diggers and gophers, according to Cain, who stated that in all more than 1,000 vermin of different species were exterminated.

Trend Away From School Test Seen

Different Attitude About Grading Seen, Reports to Linn Educator

ALBANY, Ore., July 7-(AP)—Modern school programs show a trend away from tests, a questionnaire submitted to Oregon county school superintendents revealed today.

Furthermore, it is apparent that the function of tests is not clearly understood or at least there is no agreement as to the primary function.

These conclusions were announced by J. M. Bennett, county school superintendent, who as chairman of the State Superintendents' association, which meets in Salem, July 19-21, sent inquiries of a special committee to superintendents to ascertain opinion on the school supervisory program.

Supervisory Plan

Twenty three out of 27 favored continuation of the supervisory program used in lieu of eighth grade examinations, while 25 said they had used the objective tests in 1936-37, and 17 planned to use the county objective tests next year. Fifteen regarded the test as satisfactory in length and 25 favored a standardized reading test to make a special study of this subject.

Bennett said the committee thought that "it is neither practical nor desirable that the supervisory and testing program should be a complete testing program but rather a survey of the county as a whole."

The committee recommended an objective test at the end of the first semester in language, arithmetic and spelling for specific grades and a standard reading test during the first month of school. It urged that tests be primarily supervisory devices and that teachers regard them in a professional manner.

Ray McKey Opens Dallas Law Office

DALLAS—Ray McKey is announcing the opening of law offices in Dallas. He will be located in offices adjoining those formerly used by the late J. E. Sibley. McKey was graduated from the college of law at Willamette university in 1936 and was admitted to the bar the same year. He is a member of the Delta Theta Phi honorary law fraternity. For the past year and a half McKey has been employed as manager of the local credit bureau.

Union Head Guilty Of Forging Check

HOOD RIVER, July 7-(AP)—Stanley Brown, former business manager of the CIO sawmill workers' union at Dee, who pleaded guilty to 11 counts of forgery, was sentenced to not more than five years in prison. Brown was charged with forging the signature of the union president on checks with which he withdrew union funds.

Albany Postal Receipts Increase in Half Year

ALBANY, July 7-(AP)—No business recession is reflected in the postal receipts report from Albany, G. T. Hockensmith, postmaster, revealed in his semi-annual survey. Stamp sales totaled \$12,166 for six months, a \$28 increase over the first half of 1937.

Fixless Ticket Is Not Full Reality

PORTLAND, Ore., July 7-(AP)—So far as overtime parking go, the city's new fixless traffic system apparently has some hurdles to get over before it can live up to its name. A report from the city auditor's office showed that out of 21,770 overtime parking tags issued since April 20, fines had been collected on 13,301.

Of the balance, 2,445 were outside of the court's jurisdiction, 534 were dismissed, 402 were adjudged errors by officers and 3,317 remained unaccounted for. Miscellaneous reasons accounted for the remainder, such as failure to serve warrants.
