Liquor Initiative Objection Voiced

Would Destroy Successful Control, Charged by League Director

Destruction of Oregon's successful liquor control system is the purpose of the initiative bill filed by the Anti-Liquor league Thursday, it was charged by Fred Vincent, state director of the Lawful Temperance league.

"At the same time it proposes to divert more than \$1000 daily from state revenues now going for relief of Oregon's unfortunate into a prohibition propaganda fund for the employment of prohibition agitators to completely wreck the Knox law," Vincent declared.

He termed as "fantastic" the provision which would, he said, make the liquor commission liable to limitless expensive lawsuits and damages by anyone who might be injured by another private citizen whenever liquor could be shown as a contributing factor. This would further endanger the relief funds now provided out of liquor control commission receipts, Vincent contended.

He also objected to the provision that "any relative or any individual having a direct financial interest in any citizen" could force revocation of that citizen's liquor permit without right of hearing or protest, and to propose revocation of driving permits even though no automobile figured in an alleged violation of liquor laws.

Yellow and Black For 1939 License

Oregon automobile license plates for 1939, for the first time in several years, will carry colors other than the black and white, Secretary of State Snell announced yesterday.

The 1939 license plates will have a yellow background with black letters. Snell estimated that 350,000 sets of 1939 license plates would be required.

"Aside from the low cost factor, tests have proved that yellow and black make the best combination for visibility and should be an aid in safer driving," Snell declared.

The size and general makeup of the plate, including the type of figures and letters, will remain the same as in the past.

Battery Case In Advisement

Forrest Brown Is Granted Continuance Until Today at 1:30

The assault and battery charge brought against S. P. Matheny, strawberry grower, by Lizzie Silvestro, was taken under advisement by Judge Miller B. Hayden following a trial in Salem justice court yesterday.

In the same court Forrest Brown was granted a continuance until 1:30 p. m. today for a jury trial on a charge of failing to stop at the scene of an accident. He posted \$50 bail at the sheriff's office.

Judge Hayden heard a plea of innocent entered by Lawrence Hamm to a statutory charge and set July 15 at 3 p. m. as time for preliminary hearing. Hamm failed to furnish \$3500 bail.

An assault and battery charge signed against Clyde K. Anderson, 23, was charged to a criminal information at the request of the district attorney. Anderson promptly pleaded not guilty, waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury. He put up \$25 bail. Alice Carson signed the original complaint against him.

Arguments Heard In Market Action

Plaintiff Alleges City of Portland Agreed to Buy Market

Arguments of attorneys were heard by the state supreme court yesterday in a suit brought by the Public Market company against the city of Portland, Reconstruction Finance corporation and the First National bank, involving performance of a contract.

The Public Market company alleged that it entered into a contract with the city of Portland under which the city agreed to purchase from the plaintiff a public market to be constructed by the Public Market company according to plans and specifications approved by the municipality.

The city of Portland contended that the purchase was not to be made until the market was a going concern.

Plaintiff averred that it proceeded to construct and equip the public market, prepared the required conveyances to the city, and demanded payment of the purchase price which the city declined.

Martin Is Sorry Umatilla Dam out

Governor Charles H. Martin expressed regret yesterday when informed that President Roosevelt had rejected his proposal to construct the Umatilla Rapids dam because of insufficient federal funds.

"I had hopes that work on this project would start soon," Governor Martin said.

Governor Martin recently sent a letter to President Roosevelt urging that he give immediate consideration to this project. The governor told President Roosevelt that construction of this project would ease the unemployment situation in Oregon.

Attaches of Senator McNary's office said he had not yet received the president's letter rejecting the Umatilla Rapids project.

Wharton Seeking Biennium Budget
Asks Department Heads to Prepare Estimate for Next 2 Years

State Budget Director Wallace Wharton yesterday sent letters to all state department heads and institution superintendents urging them to prepare tentative budgets for the next biennium, beginning January 1, by September 10.

"It is imperative that we receive all tentative budgets early in September," Wharton wrote.

As soon as the budgets are received they will be tabulated by the budget director and referred to Governor Charles H. Martin for final consideration. The governor, under the law, is state budget officer, and must pass on all financial requests.

The budgets later will be referred to the joint ways and means committee of the 1939 legislature.

Wharton indicated that an effort would be made to hold all budgets for the 1938-40 biennium to the minimum.
