Uncle Joe Alley Discovers Gettysburg Soldiers of 102, 104 and 112

LEBANON—E. E. Taylor and J. H. Alley (now on their way home from the reunion of civil war veterans at Gettysburg write that their stay has been full of pleasurable thrills but that Uncle Joe has lost the distinction accorded him as the oldest living war veteran. He is outclassed in his 101 years by soldiers 102, 103 and 104 while William Barnes, a colored soldier claims 112.

Alley and Taylor were among the 2000 old soldiers with 2000 attendants viewing the battle grounds and the 1296 monuments to the dead. The park with its winding roads is won'tful in its beauty. \$7,000,000 have been recently spent on its improvement and beautification, they have written.

More Records in Sight for Jerseys Owned by Hulburts of Independence

INDEPENDENCE—Showing made so far in the 305-day test of one of L. A. Hulbert's registered Jerseys—Sybil's Tessie who already holds two records—indicate that the cow will upset the record figures for mature cows.

The test aim is to hit or break the 1000-pound figure for the 305-day test, and with seven months already gone, the Jersey had, on July 1, produced 722 pounds of fat or an average of 103 pounds each month.

The records Lorna already holds are for both milk and butterfat as a two-year-old.

The Hulburts have just finished a 305-day test on Sybil Lad's Margie who made a record of 586.57 pounds of fat and 10,995 pounds of milk. Margie was started on the test at the age of one year, 11 months. This record breaker is owned by Mrs. Hulbert.

City Asked to Deed Part of Athletic Field to Aid School Project

SILVERTON—At a meeting of the Silvertown planning council Friday night plans were laid to have a committee wait on the city council asking the members of the latter if they would deed sufficient ground of the athletic field to the school district for a new high school building. Should government grant not be made, or should the district turn down the bond issue vote it is to be understood that the ground be returned to the city.

Warrant Basis Adopted for First Time in Several Years

STAYTON—W. A. Weddle was appointed this week mayor of Stayton following the resignation of George A. Smith. Weddle was to have taken office January 1, 1938.

Press of personal business was given by Smith as the reason for his resignation. He has been mayor and member of the city council for the past 20 years.

Heavy expenditures during the past few months placed the city finances this week on a warrant basis for the first time in several years. More than \$2000 in warrants are outstanding and additional warrants are to be issued for the payment of the June accounts.

Warrants Until Fall According to present indications, the warrant basis will be continued until late fall, but that the amount and number of outstanding warrants will be reduced materially before that time.

The warrant basis was necessary because of the expenditure of several thousand dollars for the installation of new water mains, and the payment by the city of several hundred dollars for the purchase of a new fire truck.

A proposal to oil the street leading to the city park was discussed by the council, but no action taken.
