"I then headed out for Baldonnel and here I am. I have no plans for returning to America. But I don't believe I will fly back. I had intended to fly across the Atlantic to Ireland and had studied maps—but this time I was headed back to Los Angeles. Honestly."
At these words there was a sparkle in the airman's eyes. There was another in Cudahy's.
"Come on and have a bath and dinner," the minister said. "I have a bed for you at home."

her husband, King Ferdinand. Upon Ferdinand's death in 1927 she retained this power while Rumania was ruled by a regency. Carol's five-year-old son Mihail taking the throne. This ended with Carol's coup in 1930.
As news of the queen's death spread all Rumania went into mourning, from prince to peasant.
The queen will be buried at the palace of Kurtea de Argesch, 80 miles from Bucharest, next to her husband. The vault there long has been prepared for her. Funeral details have not been settled.
Prime Minister Miron Cristea, who also is patriarch of the Rumanian orthodox church, administered extreme unction just before she died. He celebrated mass immediately afterward. Then as head of the government he ordered official mourning throughout the land.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 18.—(AP)—Death of Queen Marie of Rumania today reminded Oregonians of her visit to this state in 1926 and turned their minds again to the stone castle on the mottled hills of the upper Columbia which she dedicated.
Maryhill it was called and an aura of mystery had hung around it for years when the regal visitor, accompanied by Sam Hill, son of the "empire builder," visited it.
Maryhill was the result of fascination ancient castles, of England, principally, held for Sam Hill. He built one himself on the side of a high, brown mountain in Washington. It stands there, anachronistically, today, a feudal pile set down among the rimrocks and sagebrush of the wild west, across the Columbia from where the Deschutes pours its white water into the big river.
Hill's precise purpose in building Maryhill has long been a topic of fascinating speculation. That he strove to create an English royal castle is beyond doubt for near the building proper he constructed an exact replica of Stone Henge, a middle-English prehistoric ruin put up by the original Britons and so designed that the sun struck a central altar at the same time each day.
Hill once thought of offering the castle as a home for his friend, King Albert, but abandoned that idea and finally prepared it for a museum. Many objects of art it were presented by Queen Marie and one section was designated the "Rumanian room."
Since his death historical societies have slowly continued the work of converting the castle into a museum.
Queen Marie, long-time friend of the picturesque railroad man, was impressed and delighted with the building and praised his plan for creating in it a museum.
The royal trip into the northwest was fraught with intrigue and bickering. Hill was expelled from the queen's train after a dispute with an aide, but his friendship with the queen was not damaged by the episode.

union against the totalitarian Rome-Berlin axis.
Viscount Halifax, British foreign secretary, will accompany the royal party, and Leslie Hore-Belisha, British war secretary, will be in Paris at the same time. The two statesmen are expected to have long defensive alliance conferences with Premier Edouard Daladier and Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet.
Daladier and Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain of Britain exchanged secret letters a few days ago and these were expected to serve as a basis for discussions of how to reinforce the already strong democratic union in the face of Italo-German action in Spain and German activity concerning Czechoslovakia.
The government ordered 20,000 police prepared for duty throughout the visit; 20,000 reserve officers in Paris were recruited as plainclothesmen; the war ministry assigned 50,000 troops to the task; and the interior ministry called about 10,000 mobile guards.
London's famed Scotland yard worked with the Paris prefecture of police in drawing up the plans. They wanted to prevent a repetition of two bits of European history foremost in their minds: the assassination of the Archduke

the city, as well as more assurance of quick sales, to have but one realtor concentrating on selling the property.
The council voted to order the paving of an alley in block 40 and the improvement of D street between 20th and 21st streets as sufficient property owners had indicated a wish to have this done.
The council adopted a resolution to accept from the state the property adjoining the state capitol near Court and Summer streets to be used for street purposes.
A 175-foot sewer extension at 25th and Claude streets was approved.
Residents of the zone lying south of Turner road in the southeastern part of the city put before the council a request that the zone be changed from a class 2 special to class 2. Spokesmen said the district wanted fire protection and sewer facilities. No one appeared to speak against the change.
Change of the Knapp place from fire zone 2 to zone 3 was approved.
Robert J. Cone, recently injured in an accident on 12th street, will be paid \$35 by the city, settling the case in full.
W. C. Simpson, representative of the West Coast Stage company proposing operation of a bus line from Los Angeles to Seattle appeared at the meeting to request from the council a resolution expressing the city's attitude toward such an added service through here. He stated that the council's answer would be presented at an ICC hearing in San Francisco, August 1. Mayor Kuhn said the council would act on the matter at its next meeting if a written statement of the proposal were presented at that time.
Peter Gillos, proprietor of the Coney Island cafe, was granted a retail class beer license.
A letter was received from the Portland General Electric company on the matter of placing "cradles" under high tension wires running back of the city hall. The company said the present arrangement was safe as the high tension wires were heavy enough to prevent breakage and that the system was protected by switches in event of breaks.

Two Naval Cadets Die in Air Crash

Navy Seaplane Smashes in High Tension Wires Near Everett

EVERETT, July 18.—(AP)—The bodies of Aviation Cadet Joseph Carter Booth, 26, Glendale, Calif., and Jasper C. Mount, 24, Berkeley, Calif., were removed to the Sand Point naval air station this afternoon after a tragedy in which their navy seaplane smashed through a cluster of high tension wires and plunged into the Snohomish river.
Both's body was recovered within half an hour by farmers and fishermen who started rescue work at once. Mount's body was not recovered until the government snagboat W. T. Preston pulled the plane part way out of the water more than two hours later. The plane and fliers were attached to the USS Louisville anchored in Seattle harbor.
A number of witnesses saw the accident. They disagreed as to whether or not the airplane had been in trouble before it hit the power lines.
The plane, and another, had been flying in the vicinity for several minutes. Suddenly horrified spectators saw one containing Booth and Mount strike the Puget Sound Power and Light company's transmission system, which, at this point, is elevated to about 100 feet between two steel towers on opposite sides of the river. Three of the six heavy cables parted with a blinding flash and the plane, shorn of its wings, folded up and plummeted into the river 100 yards farther on.
