way—although he had landed without a passport and clearance papers.

As to the shower of contracts, Corrigan was understood to have turned all of them down with the statement that "I prefer to be footloose while I am here and won't sign anything."

He had \$2,000 for spending money, in contrast to his empty pockets when he sat down at Bal-donneil. This has come as payment for a radio broadcast to the United States.

"The \$2,000 will keep me in pocket money while I'm here," Corrigan said.

Corrigan himself was in technical detention while a guest of the American minister. He had come across the ocean without official permission, denied a certificate on the grounds that his plane was not good enough for such a flight.

(The United States department of commerce today suspended the experimental certificate for Corrigan's plane and asked the state department to deliver the order to Corrigan at Dublin.)

(Col. J. Monroe Johnson, acting secretary of commerce, explained that Corrigan by making the unauthorized flight, violated terms of the certificate which had authorized a nonstop flight from Los Angeles to New York and return.)

1939 Legislature To Pick Building

Purchase or erection of a state office building in Portland probably will be delayed until after the 1939 legislative session, it was reported here yesterday following an executive meeting of the state board of control.

The 1937 legislature authorized the purchase or erection of an office structure in Portland but failed to include an appropriation. Approximately 60 proposals are now before the board of control.

At a recent meeting of the board, the owners of the Elks Temple in Portland submitted their final proposal. The board later announced that it would act definitely on this proposal Monday, July 25.

Most of the state activities now located in Portland are housed in the Oregon building.

Morgan apprehended him for reckless driving, and found on his person a revolver and 400 pass keys. Later it was discovered the car Crawford was driving belonged to James A. Flynn of Spokane.

Superior Court Judge R. M. Webster today sentenced Crawford to a maximum of 15 years in the reformatory at Monroe for grand larceny of an automobile.

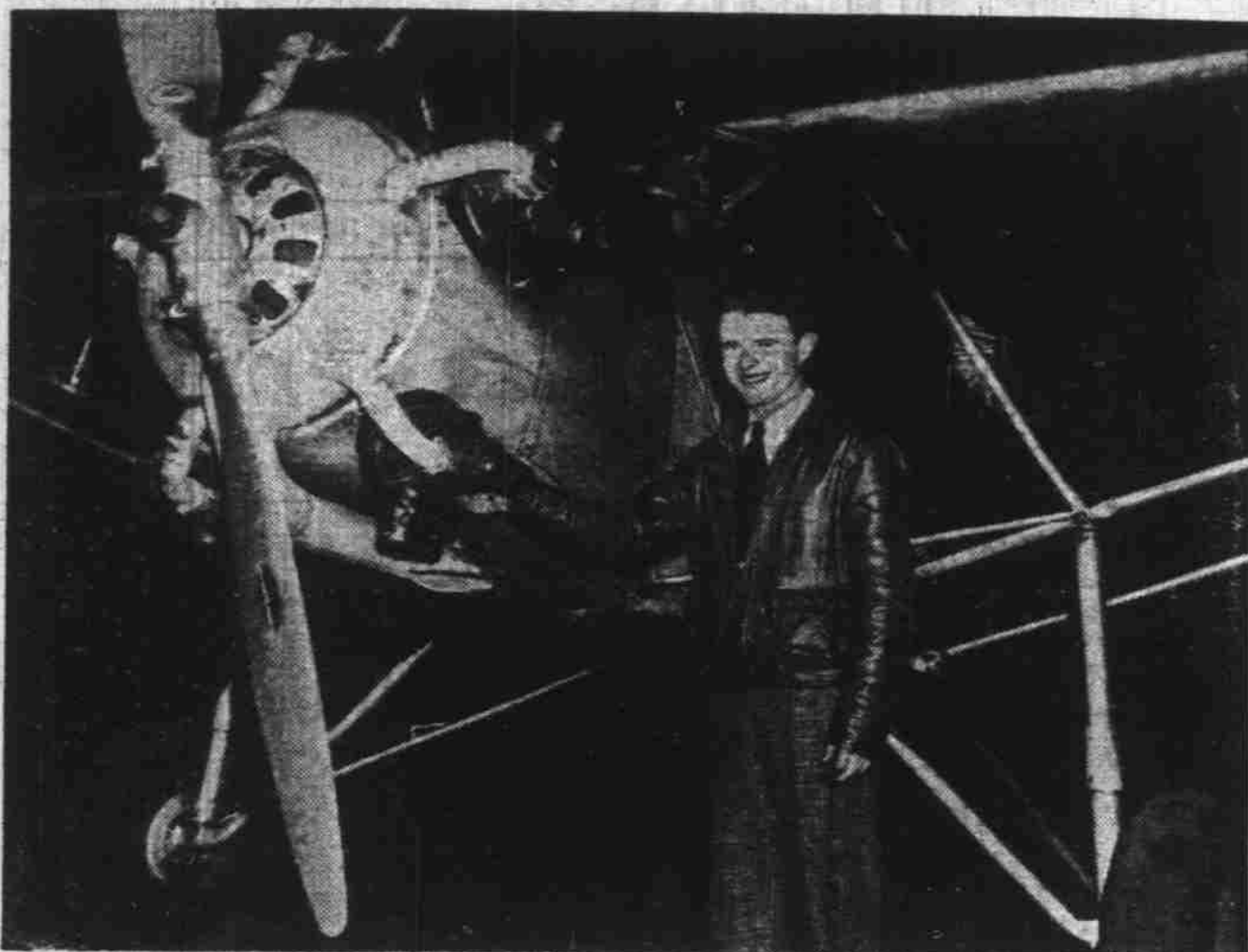

He Missed California, Hit Ireland—So He Says



Taking off from Floyd Bennett field in New York, Douglas Corrigan, 31, of Long Beach, Cal., flew out over the Atlantic, set his compass and thought he was heading for Los Angeles. Instead, 28 hours 13 minutes later he landed at Baldonnel airport, near Dublin, Ireland. The mistake flight was made in a nine year old "Jalopy" valued at \$800, loaded with \$69.60 worth of gasoline, and the only navigation instruments used were Corrigan's wrist watch and a wrongly set compass. He landed in Ireland without permit, passport or identification papers. Photo shows the adventurous flier standing beside the "flying crate" which carried him across the sea. He had built gasoline tanks on the machine for distance flying and, in order to see ahead, had to bank the plane to one side. Corrigan had flown non-stop from Los Angeles to New York and was on his "return trip" when he landed in Ireland.

Rosser Sentence To Be July 28th

D. A. Errs in Announcing Sentencing to Have Been Yesterday

DALLAS, Ore., July 19.—(AP)—Al E. Rosser, Portland, former secretary of the joint AFL teamsters' council for Oregon, will be sentenced July 28 on an arson conviction, Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker said today.

Judge Walker said District Attorney Bruce Spaulding had mistakenly announced Rosser would be sentenced today.

Rosser recently was found guilty of complicity in the burning of the Salem Box factory last November 20. Al N. Banks, Salem, former business agent for the Marion-Polk-Linn counties teamsters, is now serving a 15-year prison sentence for hiring men to fire the mill. Banks pleaded guilty.

Clarence Adams, former head of the teamsters' hiring hall at Portland, was returned there today to face trial on several indictments. He is under indictment here on an arson charge.

Ralph Moody, special prosecutor appointed by Governor Charles H. Martin, said Adams' bail on the arson charge had been reduced from \$50,000 to \$5,000. He is held under \$21,000 bail in Multnomah county.

Moody said Rosser's bail here was reduced from \$100,000 to \$25,000. Rosser is held under a total bond of \$85,000, \$50,000 of it in Washington county, exclusive of the bond here.

New Hotel Talked At Oregon Caves

GRANTS PASS, July 19.—(AP)—Directors of the Oregon Caves Resort association said today they were considering plans for an additional \$30,000 hotel to be located near the entrance to the caverns and similar in design to the chateau. Increasing numbers of visitors have taxed the facilities of the chateau, a \$50,000 structure completed three years ago. Approval of the plans is being sought from Washington.

Voters' Pamphlet Being Prepared

The work of preparing the combined voters' and measures' pamphlet for the November election got under way Tuesday under the direction of Dave O'Hara, in charge of the election division of the state department.

O'Hara estimated that more than 500,000 of these pamphlets would be required to supply the voters. The law provides that these pamphlets shall be in the mails 10 days prior to the general election.

O'Hara said the measures section of the pamphlet would be larger than that two years ago.

\$180,000 Highway Bidding Thursday

Bids for road and bridge construction involving a cost of approximately \$180,000 will be opened at a meeting of the state highway commission in Portland Thursday, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced yesterday.

Three jobs are to be awarded as PWA projects. Baldock said a number of county delegations would appear before the commission.

Vote new High School

GRANTS PASS, July 19.—(AP)—Approval of a bond issue of \$23,000 to construct a new high school with PWA aid of \$22,000, for which a grant will be sought, was voted by the Rogue river school district, 69 to 48.

Manchoukuo Protectorate Demands That Border Troops Withdraw

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near Changkufeng, close to the junction of the boundaries of Manchoukuo, Russian Siberia and Japanese Korea.

The planes then flew into Manchoukuo territory and disappeared, Domei said.

Planes, armored cars and motorized equipment were choking the trans-Siberian railway, Tokyo newspapers declared. Their editorial columns were virtually monopolized by comment on the incident.

"Japan's military operations in China have been conducted only with the surplus of the armed force," the newspaper Hochi said.

"If this (soviet) outrage has been committed under a misunderstanding as to Japan's strength, Russia shortly will repeat the mistake."

The newspaper Asahi said: "Soviet Russia's challenge to Japan and Manchoukuo for a fight seems inevitable."

Other newspapers predicted "immediate internal collapse" of Russia "if war comes."

BUCHAREST, July 19.—(AP)—Thousands of weeping peasants entered the royal palace of Peleash at Sinaia today to file past the casket of the Dowager Queen Marie.

A bouquet of white lilies rested in the queen's hands. She was dressed in a white velvet dress with Chantilly lace.

Letters opened today and written by Queen Marie in 1933 contained a request that dark lilacs be the official color of mourning for her. She wrote that it was her favorite color.

The queen, who died yesterday at 62 of a rare liver ailment, also requested in the letters that her heart be buried at Balch, her favorite resort on the Black sea. The rest of her body will be placed in the palace of Kurtea de Argesch beside that of her husband, King Ferdinand, who died 11 years ago.

British Ship Hit By Raider's Bomb

LONDON, July 19.—(AP)—Negotiations between Great Britain and Spain's insurgents to end bombing of British ships in Spanish waters were threatened today by a new attack.

The British merchant man Standland was struck in Valencia harbor by a half-ton bomb which set her afire. The fire was quickly put out, and the crew and two non-combatant committee observers escaped unhurt.

The attack was the first on British ships in Spanish ports for several weeks, a lull having followed vigorous British protests to the insurgents.

Gen White Routs Army of Crawlers

Rear Attack on Montana National Guard Takes Troops Sleeping

HELENA, Mont., July 19.—(AP)—The 41st division of the national guard was attacked at Fort Harrison today—from the rear, and by worms at that.

While division staff officers and enlisted men battled a mythical "Blue" invading army and made final plans to stem the enemy attack in the mountains to the west, a green army which wasn't at all mythical made a counter flanking attack, took the defenseless headquarters camp after a few minutes of concentrated effort and drew the "fighting 41st" back from the hills of Avon to launch a hand-to-hand encounter with the enemy.

The invading green army was composed of unnumbered regiments of sugar beet web worms which marched into the camp from the north and entrenched themselves in the cook tent and officers' quarters.

Late tonight Gen. George A. White, of Salem, Ore., commanding officer of the division, issued the following official communiqué:

"Fighting is heavy on all fronts but the 41st, armed with brooms and concentrate of lime, expects to rout the enemy within a few hours. Casualties among the enemy are running into thousands."

Command post exercises for the 41st division headquarters staff, composed of national guard officers and men from Montana, Washington, Oregon and Idaho, have been under way at Fort Harrison near here for about two weeks. The exercises will end Friday, worms or no worms.

Prune Marketing Agreement Okehed

Umatilla County and Washington Areas

WASHINGTON, July 19.—(AP)—The agricultural adjustment administration approved today a marketing agreement to regulate the interstate handling of prunes grown in Umatilla county, Oregon, and Walla Walla and Columbia counties, Washington.

The agreement will become effective July 23.

Eighty-six per cent of the participating growers in the two counties voted for the agreement. More than 200 growers, representing about 65 per cent of the average production in 1936 and 1937 in the area to be governed, took part in the referendum in June and July.

A nine-member control committee will be set up soon at a meeting of growers and handlers.

"The prune industry of Washington and Oregon now has an instrument which should enable it to keep prune shipments within the limits necessary for profitable returns to growers," said F. R. Wilcox, AAA marketing agreement director.
