

Marjorie Kimbrough Chosen as Queen of Stayton Santiam Spree

Crowning Is Friday Event

Will Follow Parade, 11:45 With Salem Cherrians Doing Honors

STATYON — Marjorie Kimbrough, Stayton girl, was chosen queen of the 1938 Santiam Spree as the five-day celebration got underway Tuesday night. She received a grand total of 1,033,300 votes.

Princesses will be Helen Hughes, Stayton; Jessie Reese, Seio; Marjorie Parton, Lebanon; LeVerne Whitehead, Turner; Marjorie Taylor, Mill City, and Ellens Wickersham, Jefferson, who finished in that order in the queen contest.

Wedding Is Feature
Besides the close of the queen contest and a queen's ball, events Tuesday night included a public wedding on a cedar bough decorated with flowers on Third street when Edith May Monroe of Jackson, Ore., and Thomas Henry Devers of Boulder, Colo., both with the Browning carnival playing here this week, were married by Rev. Bruce Grosche of Stayton Methodist church before a large throng.

W. A. Weale, newly elected mayor, made his first public appearance to preside at the wedding.

STATYON — Throngs of people have been attending the Santiam Spree celebration in Stayton the last two days. The fullest days are ahead though with a full sport program Thursday and on Friday the dedication of the new city park, the crowning of Queen Marjorie I and a Townsend rally as highlights.

The industrial parade Friday will begin at 11 a. m. and Queen Marjorie I will be crowned by King Bing of the Cherrians at 11:45 a. m.

Speakers slated for the dedication program Friday afternoon include Governor Martin, Senator Charles McNary, Congressman James Mott, Secretary of State Earl Snell, State Treasurer Rufus Holman, Clarence Wagoner of Portland and others.

The rest of the afternoon will be devoted to one of the largest Townsend rallies ever staged in this section. F. G. Delano of Salem will be master of ceremonies.

After 30 days of sailing they were shipwrecked and never reached Memphis.

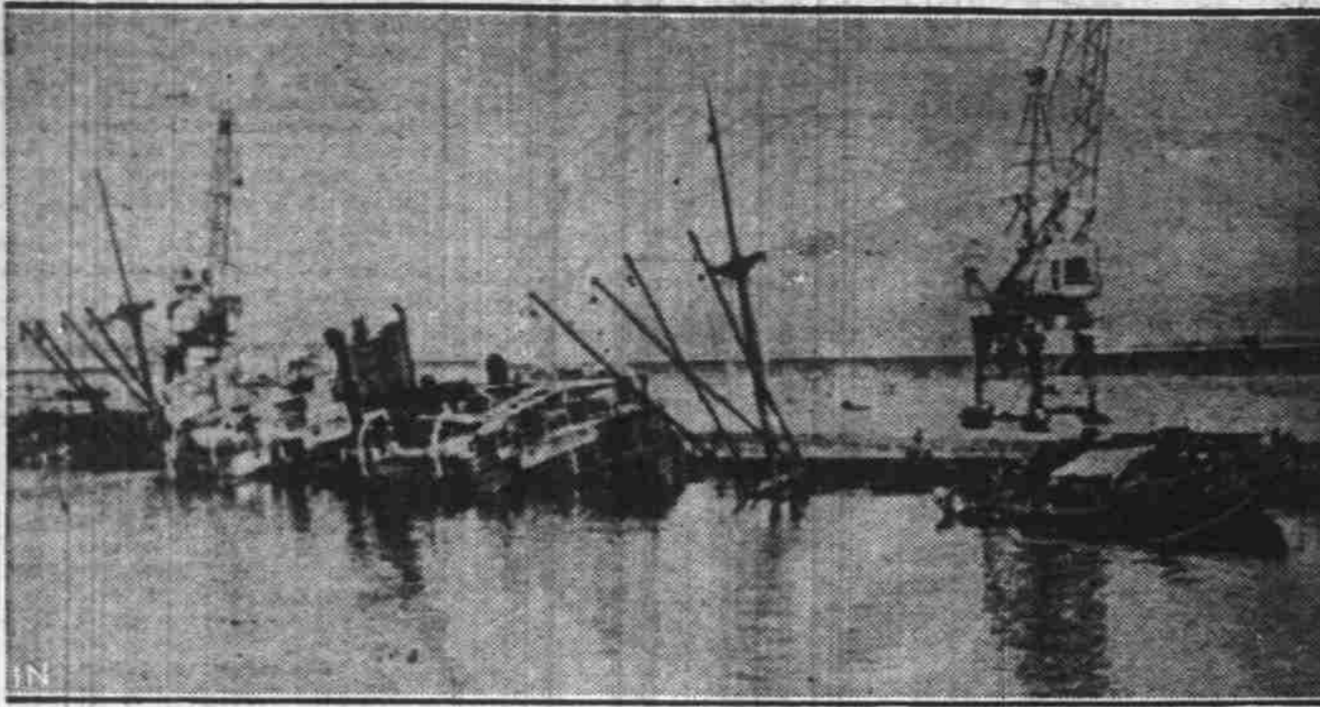
