SCIO—Some of the mildest Bermuda onions exhibited here for years are said to have been grown this season under the Stone-Phillippi plan, in which several farmers in the Scio and Jefferson areas are operating approximately 200 acres.

Portland markets are to be utilized in disposing of the 1938 crops, which include Bermuda onions, corn and cabbage.

Unusual growth in the valley has reduced yields to some extent but several carloads are to be handled at the company headquarters at Jefferson, it is stated.
