

British Troops Raid to Stop Bombing

Another Bomb Is Discovered

Palestine's Racial War Continues; Terrorism Holding Sway

HAIFA, Palestine, July 26.—(P)—British troops started extensive raids today to prevent formation of guerrilla bands which authorities feared might broaden the racial conflict between the Holy Land's Arabs and Jews.

The troops made numerous swift raids in the village-dotted hills following the death of 65 persons and injury of 107 when a time bomb exploded yesterday in a Haifa market place.

The bombing appeared to have loosened a new avalanche of terrorism.

A great loss of life was averted today when a time bomb set for 9 a. m. in the crowded Arab vegetable market of Jerusalem was discovered just 15 minutes earlier.

Three members of a terrorist band were killed when the group attacked a detachment of special constables. A 14-year-old Jewish boy and his father were slain in ambush near the Jewish settlement of Mishmar Hayarden on the river Jordan.

Black Criticism Roils Barristers

Resolution Asks Court for Information on His Eligibility

CLEVELAND, July 26.—(P)—Controversies over a resolution on the "eligibility" of Supreme Court Justice Hugo L. Black and a critical report of the special committee on administrative law ruffled the serenity of the American Bar association tonight as committees labored to perfect the machinery of justice.

Dean Edward T. Lee of John Marshall law school, Chicago, refused to withdraw his resolution asking the U. S. supreme court for information on Justice Black's eligibility to serve despite the efforts of two Alabama—one a "personal friend" of Black—to intervene.

"I am a personal friend of Hugo L. Black and I want to take the floor against this," said Circuit Judge Richard D. Evans of Birmingham, Ala., at a meeting of the resolutions committee.

Evans said the supreme court had refused to rule on Black's eligibility and there was no reason for the association to press the matter.

Marvin Woodall, past president of the Birmingham Bar association, said the resolution was "impertinent."

Lee said he thought "the bar association owes it to the people to have this question cleared up."

Woodmen's Picnic Sunday at Dallas

Playground Body Asks More Funds

A \$1386 increase in the combined city and school contribution to the 1939 Salem playground budget was requested by the playground committee last night. Submitted later to the school board, the budget was tabled pending its consideration by the city council.

The committee asked for \$3924 from the school district and \$2117 from the schools and \$2538 from the city under the 1938 budget.

Vernon Gilmore, director of recreation, told the board the city had slashed its contribution toward the current season's program some \$400 under the amount allocated to it under the budget.

Aerial Nuptials Ruled Illegal

Marriage three miles up in the air is illegal. This was the greeting Edward von Glatte and Jane Webster received when J. Albert Hutchinson of the office of Attorney General U. S. Webb gave his unofficial opinion. Van Glatte and Miss Webster left a Los Angeles flying field aboard a United Air Lines mailplane to be wed by Captain Richard Bowman, deciding to test their contention that if a captain of a ship can perform the marriage ceremony out at sea, an airplane captain should be able to do the same thing. Hutchinson's objections were that, first, the wrong kind of "sky pilot" officiated. An airplane chauffeur, Hutchinson opined, hasn't the historic background or statutory authority of a ship's captain. Second, any attempt to leave the jurisdiction of a state merely to evade its law would void the marriage, it was held.

Escapes Assassin

Major General Blanton Winship, governor of Puerto Rico, who Monday escaped an assassin's bullets at Ponce, P.R., while he was reviewing a parade. Police immediately returned the fire from among large crowds watching celebrations of the landing of American troops in the Spanish-American war.

Lieutenant Colonel Irizarry of the Puerto Rico national guard was fatally wounded. At least two persons were killed and twenty injured following the exchange of fire.

Martin Conducts 'Communist' Trial

UAW Head and Leaders He Says Communists Have Session

DETROIT, July 26.—(P)—Homer Martin and the associates he charges conspired with communists to disrupt the CIO United Automobile Workers' annual convention today behind closed doors at UAW headquarters.

Martin, international union president, marshaled 150 guards into eleventh floor corridors outside union offices to prevent interference as trial of four suspended vice-presidents began.

The UAW executive board room was so closely guarded the "defendants" twice were barred by guards because they lacked "passes" to their own trial.

When an official finally escorted them in, they marched between a long double file of guards, entered the board room and, simulating a Nazi salute, greeted Martin with "Heil Hitler."

The vice-presidents on trial, who were suspended by Martin June 13, are Richard T. Frankenstein, Wyndham Mortimer, Ed Hall and Walter Wells.

Tribute Paid Him

Associates Laud Howard at Rites

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., July 26.—(P)—Associates and friends of Charles P. Howard, president of the International Typographical union, heard him praised today at his funeral as a leader and good judge of men.

Among the more than 1000 persons who gathered to pay final tribute to Howard were John L. Lewis, chief of the CIO, and Claude M. Baker of San Francisco, successor of Howard as ITU president.

Howard died suddenly in Colorado Springs last Thursday of a heart attack.

Grandchild No. 8 Seen by Eleanor

PHILADELPHIA, July 26.—(P)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt came to Philadelphia today to see her new grandson, Franklin Delano, III, and showed her experience of being eight times a grandmother.

She knew the hospital rules and didn't try to pick up the one-week-old son of Franklin, Jr., and the former Ethel Dupont. She also was careful about comparing him with her other grandchildren.

"He's a fine boy, a sweet baby," she said as the baby's father beamed at her side.

She said the baby's mother was "doing fine."

"I'm not going to start comparing grandchildren," she said in answer to questions by reporters. "When you get older you realize you can't do that."

College Board Ends Session

Accept Recommendation for Marketing Group; Okeh Auditorium

EUGENE, July 26.—(P)—Acceptance of recommendations from the tentative report of the special committee named in organizing the marketing division for the state system of higher education, election of officers, and clearing of the way for the proposed University of Oregon-City of Eugene auditorium highlighted the business for the monthly session of the state board of higher education here today.

Willard L. Marks, Albany, was re-elected president of the board for a third term; E. C. Pease of The Dalles was re-elected vice-president; and E. C. Sammons, Portland, was named again as the member of the executive committee.

Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter, reporting in the special committee named to make recommendations for the functions and organization of the division of agricultural and industrial marketing, outlined the purpose of the group which he said was to increase the wealth and income of the people of Oregon by encouraging the use of scientific methods of marketing Oregon products.

Advisory Group Asked

Recommendations were made that an advisory committee on marketing be named, to consist of nine members, their term of service to be determined at the first session by lot. The budget for the compensation of such a set-up as previously suggested was contained in the report, including a director at \$3,000 to \$6,000; two research assistants and stenographer at \$1,200 each; travel expenses at \$1,500; and other expenses at \$1,100, making the total \$11,000.

Hillsboro Judge Passes at Coast

HILLSBORO, July 26.—(P)—Washington County Judge Donald T. Templeton, 32, died at Tillamook today following an emergency appendicitis operation. The judge was appointed by the late Governor Julius Meier and at the time was the youngest man to hold such an office.

Judge Templeton, who went to the beach for a vacation last week, is survived by his widow, a four-year-old son, and a three-month-old daughter.

The soviet government has rejected protests on asserted invasion at the two points. A communique said Foreign Commissar Maxim Litvinoff told Japanese Ambassador Mamoru Shigemitsu that, although threats of armed force might be good diplomacy elsewhere, "such methods will not succeed in Moscow." It was reported that the soviet far eastern army had rushed large detachments of troops to the Manchukuo border.
