\$30,000 Damage Suits Are Filed

Two Actions in Polk Court Sue A. G. Tibault, Result Accident

DALLAS—Two damage suits, one for \$20,000, and the other for \$10,000, were filed in the circuit court of Polk county here this week.

Emily Snyder is suing Alfred George Tibault for \$20,000 general damages as a result of an automobile collision which took place on the McMinnville-Rick-reall highway about two miles north of Rickreall on March 18, 1938.

She was a passenger in the car driven by H. A. Lowry and she charges that the defendant drove his car in a careless and negligent manner and was responsible for the collision with the Lowry car which caused her serious permanent injury. She asks for \$20,000 general damages and \$158 special damages for medical care and \$100 special damages for loss of work during the time since the accident.

H. A. Lowry is also suing Tibault for \$10,000 as a result of the same accident. He also asks for special damages which include \$73.50 for medical care and \$800 for loss of work as a result of the accident.

Bruce Spaulding, and Bagley and Hare are attorneys for the plaintiffs.

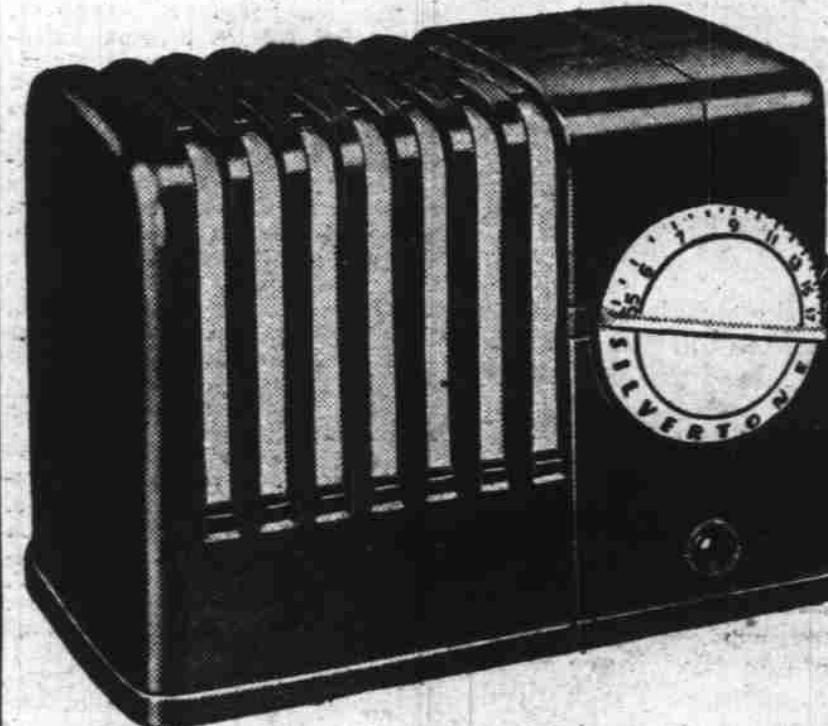

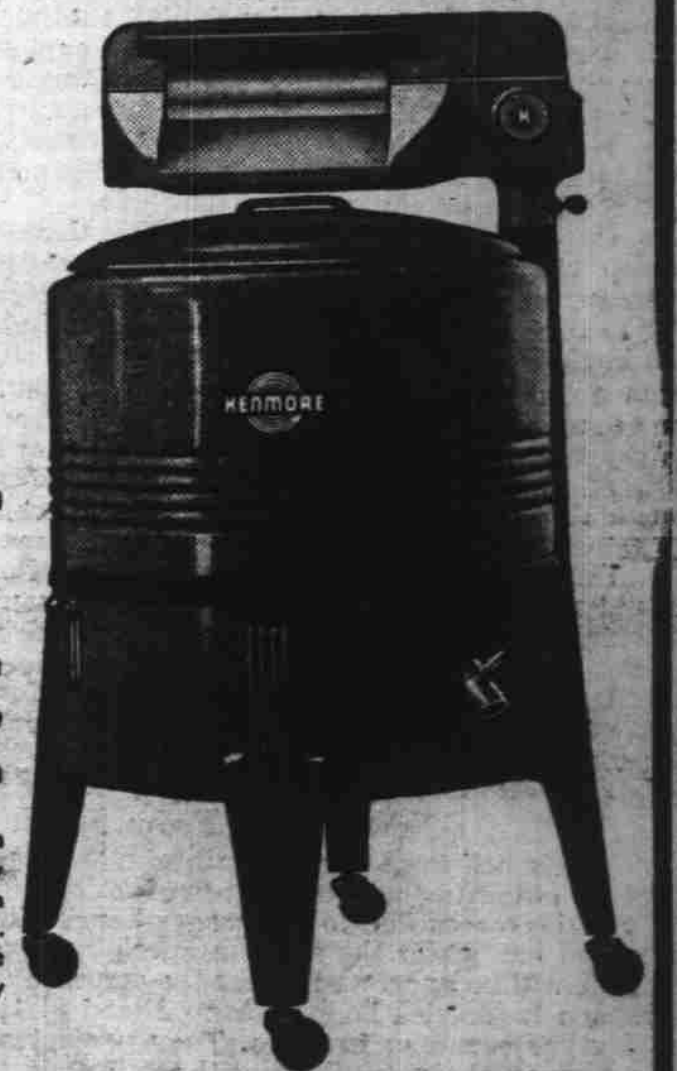
