Boeschen Development Looms—Return of Rex Kimmell, assistant attorney general, from vacation Monday probably will bring developments in the state capital reconstruction commission's condemnation suit against the Boeschen property on North Summer street, George A. Rhoter, defense counsel, said yesterday. A settlement of the case was reported pending after Kimmell left the city last week. With the Frizzell house moved to a new location and others razed, the Boeschen house stands alone on the Summer street block between Court and Chemeketa streets. The new approach to the capitol is being developed.

Dead Pilot Known—Salem pilots and airplane enthusiasts knew Gordon E. Mounce, American test pilot and airplane salesman who died in a plane crash at Yagradine, Oregon, July 29, Mounce was flying instructor for Hill Military Academy until 1937, then joined the Fleet aircraft corporation and operated the Consolidated Airways before becoming foreign representative for the Fleet firm. He is credited with having accomplished the first outside loop in a small commercial plane.

Members of the dairy manufacturers' advisory committee met here Friday to discuss the work of the state department of agriculture and drew up a plan for monthly regulatory scoring for all butter produced in the state.

The scorings will be started sometime next month, according to the schedule worked out. The two teams will alternate in the work. The teams are Earl Cavett, Portland, A. W. Hare, Portland, and Bryant Williams, department of agriculture representative at McMinnville; and John Bigler, Mt. Angel, Frank Mosler, Corvallis, and O. G. Simpson, manager of the Portland milk and cream testing laboratory.
