Forest Situation Better in State

Forest fire conditions in Oregon continued to improve yesterday with a large number of men withdrawn from both the Valdes and Smith river areas, State Forester J. W. Ferguson announced.

Ferguson estimated that the number of fires had been reduced from 210 two weeks ago to less than 60 at the present time. He said none of the lightning fires in Douglas county were serious. Nineteen of these fires were reported last Thursday.

The state forester declared that if weather conditions continued normal, virtually all of the fires would be extinguished within another week.

E. B. Edes, manager of the local plant, announced that the new building started a few months ago is nearly complete and that another will be started as soon as lumber can be procured. It will be built and equipped for the Northern Pacific Nut Growers' association at a cost of several thousand dollars.

Norwegians' Right To Realty Upheld
There is no statute in Oregon directly disqualifying nationals of Norway from taking by descent or testamentary disposition real property. Attorney General Van Winkle held yesterday.

Van Winkle said the rights of nationals of Norway in this matter were the same as nationals of Oregon.

The opinion was requested by Lewis Griffith, clerk of the state land board.

In another opinion, Van Winkle held that the state highway commission has authority to expend its funds for purchase of a beach tract of land now owned by the Gearhart Park company in Clatsop county for a public highway.

This opinion also was sought by the state land board.

Jobs big Problem, Sprague Declares
CORVALLIS, Aug. 1.—(P)—Restoration of employment is the big job confronting Oregon and the entire nation, Charles A. Sprague, Salem, republican gubernatorial candidate, told Benton county republicans at Alsea valley fish hatchery grounds Sunday.

"Jobs are the best form of social security," he continued. "Invigorate enterprise, end industrial and class strife. I believe in the right of labor to organize and bargain collectively, but I favor lawful unionism."

"We need to revitalize the republican party in Oregon, build up an organization to be effective in public affairs and support free government and ordered liberty."

\$400,000 Highway Contracts Looming

Contracts for six road jobs, involving a cost of more than \$400,000, will be opened by the state highway commission at a meeting in Portland Thursday. R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced yesterday.

Three of the projects are cooperative with the cost equally divided between the state and the federal government.

Military School's Values Revealed

Stressing the value of the military school for the great American boy, chiefly because it places him under men instructors as against the influence of women instructors usually encountered in public school, Dr. Joseph A. Hill, president of Hill Military school in Portland, yesterday noon addressed the Salem chamber of commerce luncheon.

Hill said American youth must be steered through the teen age and set forth the military school as the best type for that steering. Requisites for the American boy be listed in this order: Health, character, clean thinking, honor, patriotism and self respect.

The military school affords education and at the same time teaches loyalty to the institution, to country and to state as well as furnishing discipline, he said.

New Scholarship Is Given Kester

Word has reached Salem that Randall Kester, graduate of Willamette university in 1927, has had his scholarship of \$500 to the Columbia university law school renewed for the ensuing year, his second at Columbia.

This summer Kester is working for a New York lawyer on a ranch near Newark, New Jersey. He is leaving today with the lawyer and his family for a trip to Maine. Kester received his bachelor degree in political science and was a member of Alpha Kappa Nu, Pi Gamma Mu, Kappa Alpha Theta Alpha Phi, honoraries, and Kappa Gamma Rho fraternity.

Four Nurses Here To Do Field Work

Four nurses from the University of Oregon medical school are at the Marion county department of health for the month of August doing field work in public health nursing. The nurses include Miss Etta Wells, Miss Marjorie M. Kelting, Mrs. Mary Deatherage, and Miss Edith McManus.

Miss Wells took her training at the Salem general hospital, Miss Kelting at the Los Angeles county general hospital, Mrs. Deatherage at St. Luke's hospital, Denver, and Miss McManus at Moline public hospital, Illinois. Miss McManus and Mrs. Deatherage will return to Colorado the first of September to continue their work in public health nursing.

Banker Succumbs To Heart Attack

Mr. Holbrook had ridden to Salem with Charles Tisdale, Portland insurance broker, and had displayed no evidence of illness. As Tisdale parked his automobile Holbrook slumped in his seat. A physician was called and he was pronounced dead.

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Nye Reunion Held, Talbot

J. B. Ulrich, Salem, new President of Clan; Many Attend

TALBOT—Descendants of J. S. and Mary Chuders Nye held their family reunion Sunday in the Santiam park.

J. S. Nye was born in Ohio in 1823 and in 1844 he and Mary Chuders were married. In 1850 they started for Oregon by ox team. They stopped at a point which is now known as The Dalles, later going down the river in canoes, and reaching Willamette falls where they remained for the winter. In the spring of 1851 they located on a donation land claim about seven miles north of what is known now as Jefferson, where they lived until Nye's death in 1902.

His widow moved to Salem, residing there until her death in 1923.
