Aid Car Handles Two Death Cases

Report for July Reveals 67 Persons Assisted With 63 Calls
Two fatalities were reported by the city first aid squad in its summary of cases attended during the month of July. One patient was dead upon arrival, and a CCC boy

who broke his neck in a dive into Silver Creek died eight hours after being transported from Silver Creek Falls to a local hospital.

Traveling 349 miles during the month, the car and squad gave aid to 67 patients in 63 calls and did special duty for the VFW convention, labor parade and picnic. Eleven of the 67 patients were injured while at play, including: lacerated skull by a golf club; a bad skull bruise by a golf ball; cut foot severing arteries while patient was barefoot; broken neck, hit by a baseball bat; cut while diving; cut while swimming; hit by car while playing on bicycle; lacerated scalp from diving; broken neck while diving (deceased); arterial bleeding of foot cut while swimming; and foot cut by glass while wading.

Chest Drive Plan To Be Well Made

Thorough organization in advance will mark the second annual campaign of Salem Community Chest, with the committee in charge now holding weekly meetings to discuss details of the program. These meetings will be held on Friday noons hereafter to accommodate members of other luncheon groups which meet on Thursday. The "kickoff" program for this year's campaign has been set definitely for October 17 and the "victory dinner" October 26, nine days later. A committee is working on an outstanding feature for the opening event. The campaign this year will be strictly a Salem-managed affair, with C. A. Kells as executive secretary. Last year when the program was new here, an outside agency managed the campaign. Usually this agency directs Community Chest campaigns for several years after the system is inaugurated but officers of the Salem chest felt that local leaders were competent to take over this year.

Delbert Brown, 83, Called at Albany

ALBANY—Delbert Brown, 83, retired farmer, died at his home in this city Thursday morning. Funeral services are to be held from the Fort Miller funeral home at a time to be set later. Burial will be in the Masonic cemetery. Mr. Brown came to Albany 25 years ago from Colorado, in which state he had followed farming. For five years after coming here he farmed, and then retired, moving into the city. He was a member of the different Masonic bodies. While living in Colorado Mr. Brown married Ottawa Knight. She died in Albany on December 5, 1923. A sister, living in California, is the only survivor.
