Mid-Term Grads To Be Eliminated

SILVERTON—Starting this autumn, the beginning of the end of mid-year classes at Silvertion schools will become effective. At a meeting Wednesday night of the Silvertion school board, the directors voted to permit all children 6 years old by December 1 to enter the first grade. None will be permitted to enter after the holiday season. It is the hope of the board that by this method eventually mid-term graduations will be eliminated.

The board also voted tuition contracts for Clackamas and Marion counties yet remain in the Silvertion school faculty, two in the high school and two in the grades. These will be filled at a meeting to be held next week.
