Retired Banker's Estate Valued at \$25,000 in Order in Probate
 The late Roswell C. Davis, retired North Dakota banker who spent his last 14 years in Salem, left an estate of personal property estimated worth in excess of \$25,000, according to a probate order entered here yesterday appointing the widow, Carrie C. Davis, as executrix. The estate will be appraised by George H. Rjches, Irene Roemhildt and Earle M. Duce.
 The Davis will left all personal effects to the widow, \$5000 each to his two daughters, Thelma of Salem and Helen Davis Gordon of Chehalis, Wash., waived any debts owing his estate by the First Presbyterian church here, left \$150 to the Presbyterian church of Belfield, ND, his former residence, and placed the residue of the estate in a trust in charge of John O. Miltzen of Belfield, who was authorized to have Ladd & Bush Trust company serve in his place if he chose.
 The trust provisions give life income from the trust estate to Mrs. Davis and leave capital and income to be distributed after her death to the daughters.

Rutherford Trial To Reopen Today

CCC Enrollee Is Fought With Knifing in Fight at Dance Hall
 The trial of William Rutherford, Alabama CCC enrollee, on a charge of assault on John Hafner with a knife will reopen at 9 o'clock this morning with the state putting Deputy Sheriff B. G. Honeycutt on the stand in an effort to impeach defense testimony. Only state rebuttal testimony remains before closing arguments are made to the jury.
 The state yesterday sought to prove that Rutherford attacked Hafner with a knife near a Silver creek falls dance hall the night of June 15. Its witnesses included John and Walter Hafner, Roman Kintz, H. C. Tomlinson, Miro DeSantis, Herbert Geschner, Frances Ruettgers and Morris Maynard.
 Lawrence Brown, defense attorney, told the jury he would show that Rutherford was innocent because he was so intoxicated at the time of the altercation he could not distinguish between right and wrong. Seven CCC men including two officers testified for the defense.

UCC Claimants Paid in Full

Third of Eligibles Exhaust Current Insurance, Paid Average of \$100
 One-third of the 65,609 determined eligible claims against the state unemployment compensation fund have been paid to zero balance and cumulative disbursements totaled \$4,313,614 at the close of business for July, commission officials said.
 Those who have exhausted their current jobless insurance rights received an average of \$100 each and the gradual reduction of the claim load caused another 13 per cent drop in benefit payments for July as compared with June. July totals were 35 per cent less than those for May.
 Portland Has Major Share
 The Portland metropolitan area, which includes Washington and Columbia and parts of Clackamas counties, accounted for 46 per cent of the July state total of \$475,870.
 This amount was distributed over 43,341 checks, bringing the cumulative check total since benefit payments started in January to 381,003.
 Salem Has 4 Per Cent
 Twenty-one other employment office districts of the state participated in benefit payments during July in the following order:
