
Petition on File

One-third o fthe 65,609 determined eligible claims against the state unemployment compensation fund have been paid to zero balance and cumulative disbursements totaled \$4,313,614 at the close of business for July, commission officials said.

Those who have exhausted their current jobless insurance rights received an average of \$100 each and the gradual reduction of the claim load caused another 13 per cent drop in benefit payments for July as compared with June.
