Oregon City Relative Is Visitor for Boy Shot Resisting Arrest

Hospital officials said last night Tom Civitanov, youthful Sacramento youth who was shot down Thursday night by a city officer when he resisted arrest, was resting nicely and they felt certain of his recovery.

A relative who resides in Oregon City visited the 17-year-old boy yesterday, and another telephoned from Sacramento. Parents of the boy, who reside at 3300 X street, Sacramento, were notified via telegram Thursday night by police.

Civitanov, confessed burglar of Bishop's clothing store Wednesday night, is alleged to have resisted Officer Harold Deacon's attempt to search him. Deacon caught the boy by lying in wait in the jungle at the foot of Cheekets street, near a cache of part of the loot acquired in the Bishop's burglary.

Starts Collection Of Money Orders

Crawford of Salem that he is making the first collection ever made of money order receipts, and wants one from every postmaster in the country.

Rutherford Freed Of Knifing Count

Jury Takes Half Hour to Return Verdict Upon Enrollee of CCC

William Rutherford, CCC enrollee formerly located at Silver Creek falls, was acquitted in circuit court yesterday afternoon of a charge of assaulting John Hafner of Sublimity with a knife. The jury spent less than 30 minutes in reaching a verdict.

The Alabama youth gave himself up at the district attorney's office here a few days after the alleged altercation at the Silver Falls dance hall June 15. He said he heard he was wanted in the case.

Rural Mail Box Repair Is Asked

Crawford Urges Patrons of Local Routes to Join US Move

In line with a national move to put rural mail boxes in shape, Postmaster H. R. Crawford is asking all rural patrons of the Salem postoffice to see that their mail boxes are on a firm standard, that they conform to standards of the postal department, that the name appears plainly on the box and that they be painted white or aluminum.

It is urged that non-standard boxes be junked for either of the two types approved by the post-office department.

Brush Carriers Carrier
Local carriers have called attention to the fact that some patrons are not keeping brush cut away from their mail boxes, and for this reason substitute carriers sometimes miss boxes.

Names plainly printed on the boxes is also especially important for guidance of the substitute carriers.

148 Request Work Here During Week

Salem and Eugene led all Oregon employment offices in the state except Portland in new applications filed for jobs during the last week in July, the state unemployment compensation commission announced here yesterday. Portland had 642, Salem and Eugene 148 each.

Eleven per cent reduction in the active file for the state was noted. New applications dropped 12 per cent and renewals, 9 per cent.

The improved trend was reflected in a 23 per cent drop in filing of original claims for unemployment compensation.
