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Benefit Check Not for Felon

Prisoners Ineligible for Compensation, Though They Are Jobless

Because inmates of jails in various sections of the country have received jobless insurance benefit checks while serving sentences, an erroneous impression has been given the public that jail is the profitable spot to await a new employment compensation commission official is declared, upon being apprized of an instance in Lane county.

"A man in jail certainly is not available for work and the law requires that he must appear at a state employment office and certify not only that he was unemployed during the week but that he was able and available for work before his claim for benefits will be honored for that week," explained Ralph H. Campbell, counsel for the state unemployment compensation commission.

Panacea Won't Work
The admonition "go to jail and earn unemployment compensation" may sound like a utopian panacea for economic adversity, but it won't work under the unemployment compensation law Campbell pointed out. The official explained that there is nothing in the law to prevent a man who obtained compensable status before going to jail from receiving a check while incarcerated but it would have to cover a period prior to going to jail during which the claimant appeared and certified his ability and availability for work, as well as to unemployment status.

The only possibility seen by commission officials to circumvent the law while serving a jail term would be for authorities to turn prisoners loose long enough to make an employment office call and thus far none in Oregon have admitted such an act.

The improvements include removal of the overbreak incidental to placing the subgrade, elimination of trees and landscaping.

The new building houses the latest facilities, and conveniences within its 40 by 90 feet of cream-colored stuccoed walls, including a small sound-proofed radio broadcasting booth and an adjacent reception room, p. as rooms, a first aid station, telephone and telegraph headquarters and all administrative offices.

Erected under a WPA grant, the building is semi-modernistic in design.

Crochet Contest Feature
This year's winners of the crochet classes at the fair will be eligible to compete in the second national crochet contest to be held in New York City this fall. The grand national prize winner, in addition to regular prizes, will receive a free trip to the metropolis as a guest of the national crochet bureau.

County Deadline 15th
Oregon counties planning to exhibit at the state fair should submit their entries by August 15. Manager Leo G. Spitzbart said this week. Several counties have already made their applications. It was announced.

Other space is reported as going rapidly, with all available room in the machinery shed taken up. The biggest machinery exhibit in years is predicted.

Hearing on Dalles Road Set Tuesday

The state highway commission has called a hearing at Klamath Falls next Tuesday, in connection with the proposed relocation of part of the Dalles-California highway through that city.

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
