Frogil Heaters Are new Type

Hot Blast Down Draft Is new Application for old Principle

Using a new application of an old principle, Frogil air-conditioning oil heaters incorporate a hot blast, down-draft tube to make one of the outstanding improvements in oil circulators since their inception, according to Adolph Nelson of Nelson Bros. Inc.

"By using secondary air for combustion, one-third more heat can be obtained from a gallon of oil in these heaters than could be obtained in the former types," Nelson said. "And for the first time we have an oil circulator that can be forced the same as a wood or coal heater."

"If the hot blast, down-draft tube were used in conventional designed oil heaters, it would burn them out in a few hours under forced firing. Frogil heaters have combustion chambers of special alloy heat-resisting cast iron, assuring long life."

Oil Tanks Removable

Other Frogil features pointed out by Nelson are cabinets in full porcelain and crackle finishes (also available in walnut, ebony or two-tone); pots and oil tanks easily removable for cleaning; the Frogil Ray-Dor (on some models) that throw out the same radiated heat as a fireplace without interfering with the function of a circulating heater; stainless steel used in construction of the pots; variable heat output for cold days and more temperate days; sizes running from one to 8-room heating capacity, and many others.

WEST SALEM—A petition to the council bearing 155 names protesting the enlargement of the junk yard at Second and Patterson, and asking for an investigation of the matter, was presented to the city council at its session this week. After discussion it was voted by all members to withdraw the motion of July 26, to permit Saffron and Kline to enlarge their junk yard.

The building committee and W. L. LaDue were appointed to investigate water-proofing of the wall of the city hall and call for bids on the job.

An entrance has been built on the east end of the building to the fire room and 200 yards of dirt will be secured to fill in east of the hall.

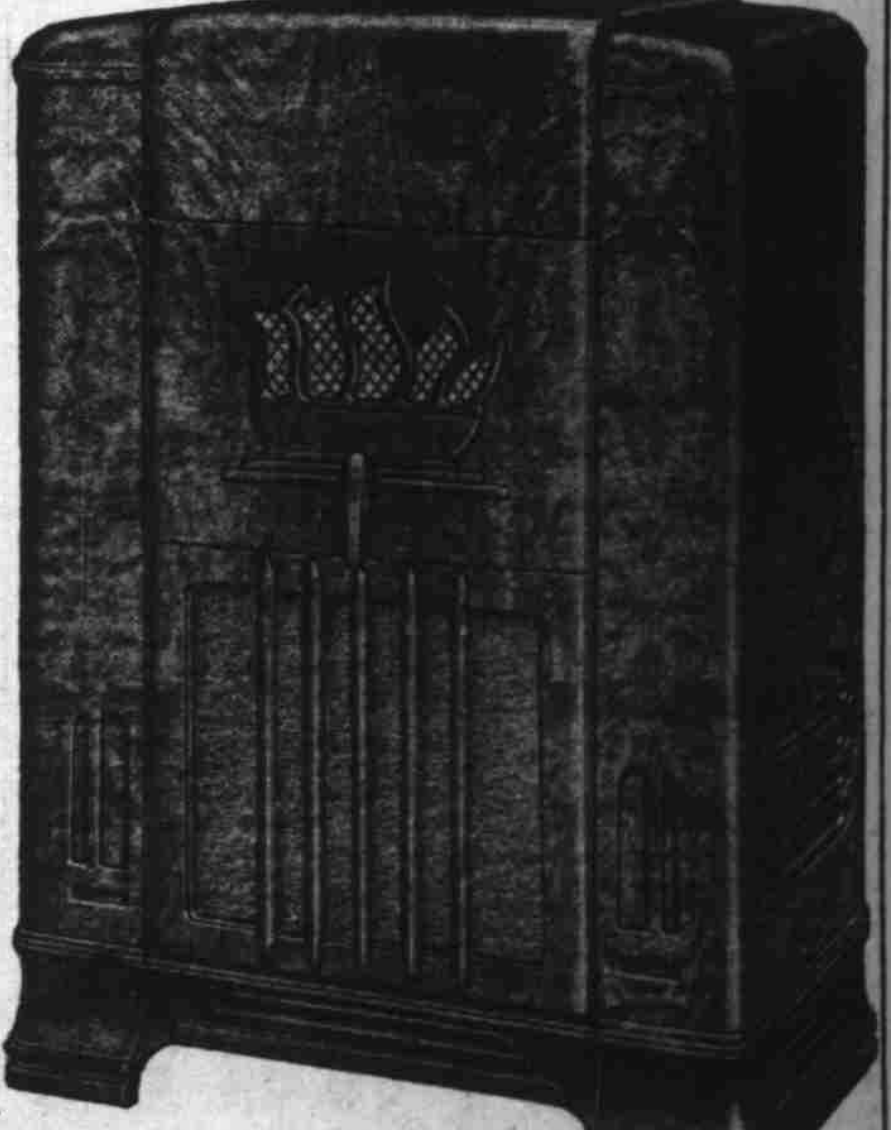
