Chicago Epic On State Bill

Picture of Chicago Fire Took two Years' Study in Production

History is slow in the making—and, the movie men have found, just as slow in the re-making. In the current 20th Century-Fox offering, "In Old Chicago," which makes its debut at the State theatre today, the major part of the picture's action deals with that hectic year 1870-1871, culminated by the historic fire in October of the latter date. And the records of the studio show that it required a year and a half of intensive effort to bring that story to the screen.

It was nearly two years ago that Darryl F. Zanuck, production chief at 20th Century-Fox, decided to base a picture upon Niven Busch's story, "We, the O'Learys." It was to be a romantic film, of spectacular proportions, climaxed by a reenactment of the fire. Immediately this decision was made, the research experts of the studio were set to work amassing what finally amounted to 240 pages of closely typed information on scenes, costumes, habits of speech and particular mannerisms of famous characters who figured in the story.

With the sets under way, there came the problem of casting. From his own lot, Zanuck drew Tyrone Power, Alice Faye and Don Ameche for leading roles. From elsewhere, he obtained the services of Alice Brady and Andy Devine. Supplementing them were a host of important featured players, Phyllis Brooks, Sidney Blackmer and Berton Churchill,

Robinson Takes Part of Doctor in new Crime Film at Elsinore

Edward G. Robinson comes to the screen of the Elsinore theatre today in what he has described as the most fascinating role of his career—the extraordinary title character of "The Amazing Dr. Clitterhouse," a bizarre crime film with hilarious undertones of comedy based by Warner Bros. on the London and New York stage hit of the same name.

Well Irrigation To Be Stressed On Annual Tour

Wells as a source of water for Willamette valley irrigation will be emphasized on the ninth annual Willamette valley irrigation tour scheduled for August 11 and 12, announces Arthur King, extension soil conservationist at Oregon State college.

The tour this year will devote the first day to the Grand Island region in Yamhill county, where developments of primary interest to growers of vegetables, berries and other specialized crops will be seen. The start will be from the Dale Fowler farm at 9 o'clock.

The second day the tour will start on the Oregon State hospital cottage farm and will continue through Marion and Linn counties. Those concerned with irrigated pasture, clover for seed and other field crops will find most interest in the second day.

Arthur M. Poper, leading authority and geologist with the US geological survey, will be present throughout the tour to answer questions on irrigation wells.
