Maizels Slate Is Cleaned up

Order Discharges Former Control Board Clerk From Sentence

The slate of Albert G. Maizels, former state board of control clerk, was wiped clean yesterday when Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon entered an order declaring him fully discharged from a five-year prison sentence and parole imposed October 27, 1933, for defalcation of \$2052 in state funds. Maizels, 22 at the time of the offense, has been of good behavior and merits judgment of complete discharge, the order stated. The money was repaid the state.

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Naval Board Due To Inspect Base

Mott Optimistic Sanction of Report Will Come if Report Is Good

The naval inspection board, authorized by the Mott amendment to the naval construction bill, will be in the Columbia river area about August 25 to inspect the proposed Tongue Point naval base, Congressman James W. Mott was advised yesterday by Admiral William D. Leahy, chief of the bureau of naval operations. Details of the five-man board's itinerary in Oregon will be furnished Congressman Mott some time next week. Members of the board are all naval officers.

Authorized in Bill
The naval construction bill directs investigations into and reports on the need for additional submarine, destroyer and naval bases and directs a report back at the next session of congress, when the reports will go to the naval committee.

Congressman Mott pointed out yesterday that the naval affairs committee has already approved the Tongue Point bill, but approval has never been forthcoming from the navy department.

The congressman was optimistic that in the event the naval inspection board gives a favorable report, sanction of the navy department will follow, paving way for the long-sought Tongue Point naval base.

Sprague Suggests Business Bureau
A suggestion that Salem create its own bureau on market information for collection and tabulation of data to show the business trend was presented to the Salem Credit association yesterday noon by Robert Sprague in his address, "Getting to know Salem."

Sprague refuted the frequent accusation that "Salem is a poor business town." On the basis of

his compilation of figures for 12 other towns of similar population and location with respect to metropolitan centers, he declared Salem is one of the most up and coming and successful business towns not only in the northwest, but in the entire country.

The figures he presented were based on the last available US department of commerce census of retail business. He also presented facts from a housewives' survey conducted by The Statesman advertising department, with which he is connected.
