Hutch Puts up 19th Victory

Seattle's Sensation Gets 19th Win to Celebrate 19th Birthday

(By the Associated Press) Freddie "Schoolboy" Hutchinson, the Pacific coast's sensational rookie pitcher, celebrated his 19th birthday last night by winning his 19th game of the season before the largest crowd in Seattle baseball history—15,000.

Allowing but five hits, "Hutch" downed the San Francisco Seals, 3 to 2, to make it three in a row. The fans dropped the Seals to fifth place and lifted the Rainiers from that position to a tie for third place with San Diego, which lost 3 to 2 to the Oakland Oaks.

Friday's turnout established the young 200-pound righthander as perhaps the greatest current drawing card in the Coast league. Each night performance of his brings record crowds and the crowds have increased as Hutch's winning streak grows.

Attendances from 11,000 to last night's 15,000, estimated by Business Manager Bill Mulligan, have watched the boy amass his 19 triumphs against six defeats and become the leading league hurler.

Hutchinson got a base hit and scored a run in Seattle's big inning to help his own cause along.
