Oil Haul Trailer Is Denied Permit

Application for a permit to haul a 40-foot oil trailer over the North Santiam highway from Niagara to Detroit was denied by the county court yesterday on the grounds the operation was dangerous from the standpoint of impeding traffic and possibility of breaking down bridges. The court said the applicant, a concern holding a contract to haul oil for the 17-mile surfacing job above Detroit, would either have to move the trailer in by railway or over the highway from the east end.

The trailer has three axles, each of which would carry a weight of 15 tons as against a six-ton load limit on bridges.

\$250,000 Contest Plan for Movies

Traffic Accidents Below 1937 Levels

Oregon traffic accidents during July fell below 1937 levels for the fourth consecutive month. Secretary of State Earl Snell said yesterday.

There were 2,532 accidents last month, a 25 per cent drop from July, 1937.

There were 36 traffic deaths, against 41 in July, 1937, and 597 persons injured, compared with 747.

Twenty eight of the 36 counties during the first seven months this year had fewer accidents than last year, while 22 counties had fewer injuries and 26 had fewer deaths.

Wheeler county has not had a traffic death for 29 months, while Jefferson county had the second longest death-free streak of 20 months.

Treasurer States Peddling Illegal

Because of the many complaints coming from Salem residents against itinerant peddlers and magazine subscription agents, City Treasurer Paul H. Hauser yesterday stated any such peddlers or agents now engaged in canvassing the town are doing so illegally.

"There are at present no licenses issued," stated Hauser, "to peddlers or magazine subscription agents, and until further notice this office will not issue one-day permits to these itinerants as heretofore."

Such licenses, Hauser indicated, will not be issued until favorable action on each applied for has been taken by the city council.

60 Workers Start On Banks Project

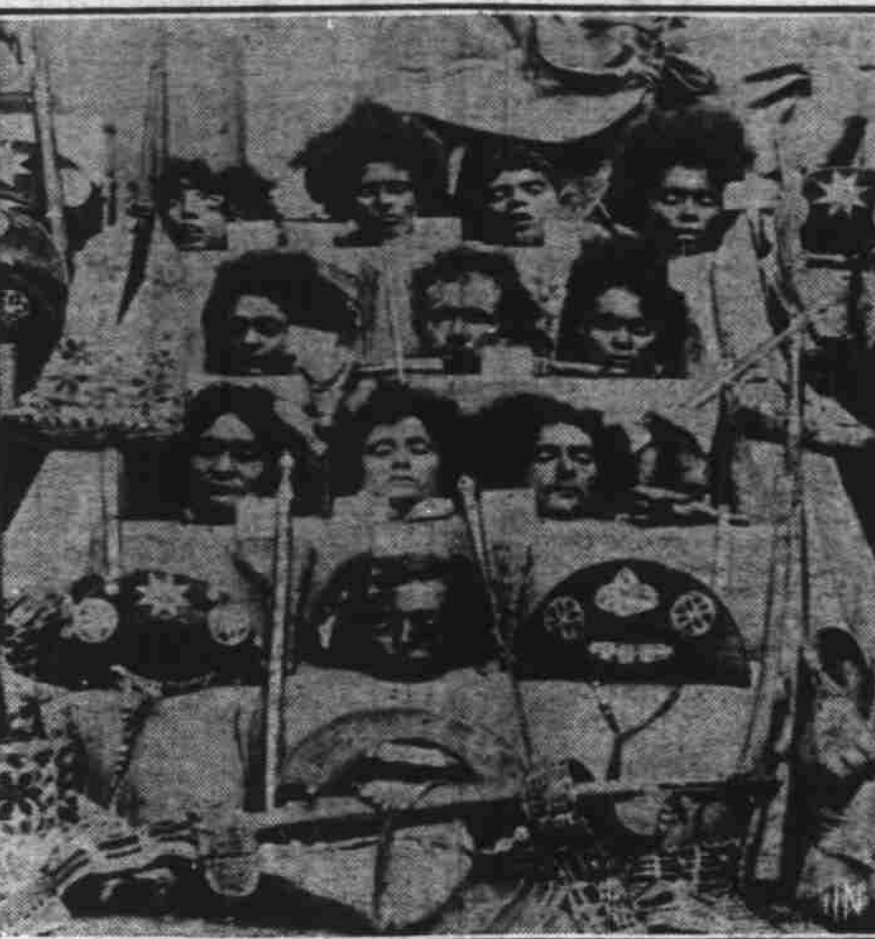

In 1916 he was graduated from Salem high school and completed a course at North Pacific Dental college in 1919. He at once established practice of general dentistry in Salem.

In 1920 he was married to Grace Davis. They have two children, Robert W. 16, and Joan 6, who survive as do his mother, Mrs. W. V. Johnson and sister, Miss Lella Johnson, both of Salem.

Dr. Johnson was appointed city councilman last January on resignation of Edwin C. Goodenough, and served until June, when successor was seated following the May election. Polk Fair Due In two Weeks

Many Organizations Take Booths; Prizes in 4H Work Attractive

DALLAS—Two weeks hence the annual Polk county fair will be in full operation, according to County Superintendent Josiah Willis. The fair will be held at Monmouth this year on September 1 and 2.

During the past week representatives from Falls City grange, Brush College grange, and the Federated Women's club have reserved booths for the community exhibits. Any other community wishing to exhibit at the fair should reserve a booth by writing to County Superintendent Willis on or before August 30.

About \$1200 has been set aside by the Polk county fair board for 4-H club premiums. Every club member who makes an exhibit at the fair will receive a prize.

In all club work except livestock the prizes will be as follows:

First prize, \$4; second prize, \$2.50; third prize, \$1; fourth prize, 75 cents; and fifth prize, 50 cents, and each additional entry 25 cents.

In livestock, including calves, swine, goats and sheep, the prizes will be as follows:

First prize, \$6; second prize, \$4; third prize, \$2.50; fourth prize, \$2; fifth prize, \$1.50, and each additional entry \$1.

Must Place Early
All 4-H club members, Future Farmers of America and Boy Scouts who wish to make a display should have their entries completed and their articles in place not later than 9 o'clock on the morning of September 1.

Superintendent Willis has suggested that all exhibitors bring their articles which are not perishable to the county fair grounds on August 31st and have them entered. Entry clerks will be at the fair grounds until 10 p. m. on August 31st and will make all entries.

4-H club members who wish to take part in the demonstration contests and judging contests should notify Superintendent Willis not later than August 25 so that he may arrange a program of contests.
