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Drink Measure Argument Filed

Opponents of Initiative Fear Bill May Renew Bootlegging Evil

Argument for publication in the measures' pamphlet opposing the initiative measure providing that all intoxicating liquors, including beer, shall be dispensed in state liquor stores, was filed in the state department here Tuesday.

Particular objection was voiced to that provision of the initiative bill which would make it unlawful to establish a state liquor store within a half mile of a school or church. The negative argument alleged that this provision would wipe out most of the existing state liquor stores and make it impossible to establish new ones.

Another provision of the initiative bill making the state liquor commission responsible for damages for the sale of liquor to persons without a liquor permit or other violations of law was attacked in the argument. It was contended that this provision was unfair and unreasonable and would weaken the Oregon liquor setup.

Fear Bootlegging Revival
Charge also was made that passage of the initiative measure would revive bootlegging and reduce the liquor receipts to such an extent that there would be no funds for old age assistance.

The negative argument was filed by the Law and Temperance League of Oregon, of which Walter P. Fell, Eugene, is president. The original initiative measure was filed by the Anti Liquor League of Oregon, through Hayward H. Johnson.

The time for filing negative arguments expires today.

The measure pamphlet will be printed and circulated prior to the November election.

Building Movies Will Be Screened

FHA Film to Be Shown to Selected Group in Salem Friday

Announcement of the showing of a recently produced sound motion picture film entitled "Today We Build" was made today by Jameson Parker, state director of the federal housing administration for Oregon.

The film will be shown to a group of business men and women, including officials of the city of Salem, mortgage lenders, realtors, lumbermen, contractors and others directly interested in the home building program at the auditorium of the chamber of commerce at 8 p.m. Friday, August 26.

The film is strictly educational and deals with a 45-minute discussion and showing of the housing problems and conditions which confront all sections of the United States, as well as some of the European countries today. Considerable time and energy has been spent in producing the film, and it is declared, by those who witnessed the preview several days ago in Portland, to be one of the most constructive films of its type yet produced.

Also appearing on the program will be speakers prominently identified and associated with the city government and the building trades industry.

Les Hite's negro dance band will be a special attraction this year at the free dances each night. Musical programs are being arranged for each day by the state federation of music clubs. It is planned to offer a minimum of entertainment in the forenoon, so that attention may be concentrated on the exhibits and judging events, with a maximum of entertainment in the afternoon and evening.
