

3 Boys Suffocate In Caved-in Gully

HAMBURG, Ia., Aug. 25.—(AP)—Three small boys were buried alive near here today when the side of an old, deep gully they were playing in caved in. A fourth youngster escaped unhurt. Rescuers recovered the bodies of Glen Mullen, 7, son of Mr. and

Mrs. Alex Mullen, and Robert Larry Briggs, 6, and John Stewart Briggs, 9, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Briggs, after several hours work. The fourth boy was Carl Mullen, 3.

The accident was not reported for several hours. Finally, authorities said, parents questioned Carl as to where the other boys were and led them to the cave-in. Mullen then telephoned for aid from Hamburg.

Authorities said the boys probably suffocated.

Social Security Extension Is Planned

Farm Laborers To Be Covered

Domestics and Others now Excluded Would Get Insurance

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The social security board is nearing completion of a three-month study which may result in extension of federal old age insurance to 16,000,000 farm hands, hired girls and other wage earners now excluded from the insurance system.

A report to the board's advisory council is due Sept. 15. Expansion Has Been Goal

Eventual expansion of the social security law to take in all who work for wages has been the goal of leading social security advocates since congress passed the present statute three years ago.

Due largely to unsolved problems of administration, the act's old age insurance provisions were limited in the main to employees of industrial and commercial concerns.

On the law's third birthday, August 15, President Roosevelt called for expansion.

"What we are doing is good," he said in a radio address. "But it is not good enough. To be truly national, a social security program must include all those who need its protection. Today many of our citizens are still excluded from old-age insurance and unemployment compensation because of the nature of their employment. This must be set right; and it will be."

Experts Consider Problem

For weeks prior to the president's address, board experts had been trying to work out some system of collecting old age insurance contributions from farm laborers, domestic servants, and casual workers—and their employers. Innumerable problems arose, such as the frequent shifting of workers from one job to another; the high proportion of employees to employers, often a one-to-one ratio; and the lack of business and record-keeping facilities of farmers and housewives.

Establishment of a stamp system similar to England's has been suggested as one way of administering old age insurance for farm, casual and domestic help. Unemployment stamps are purchased at British postoffices each pay-day and affixed to the employee's unemployment insurance books. The money from the sale of the stamps goes into the government's unemployment fund.

On the basis of 1930 census figures, the board estimates there are 2,800,000 agricultural workers, 2,103,000 servants and 10,646,294 self-employed workers. The latter group includes farmers and fishermen.

Hearing of TVA Charges Closes

Power Companies Tried to Halt Setup by Saying It Yankee Plan

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Aug. 25.—(AP)—The congressional committee investigating the TVA wound up hearings here today after testimony that power company representatives tried to dissuade farmers from signing up for TVA power by telling them there was a "bunch of Yankees behind it" and lines would never be built.

Committeemen also heard testimony designed to show:

1.—The Tennessee Electric Power company shifted its advertising from a newspaper favoring TVA and public power to a new competing newspaper opposed to the public power program.

2.—The municipal electric power board, erecting a distribution system duplicating that of the local company, is willing to negotiate immediately to buy out the utility's Chattanooga system but will not wait on a possible statewide project for public acquisition of the company's facilities.

After three days of hearings here, in which Francis Biddle, committee counsel, sought to show the efforts of power interests to hamper public power by propaganda, influencing voters and other means, the congressmen and senators left for Knoxville where the investigation will continue tomorrow.

AP Chief States Journals Strong

PORTLAND, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Newspapers have lost none of their strength or position during depression years, Byron Price of New York, executive news editor of the Associated Press, said here today.

On the contrary, he said, most of them have shown circulation growth.

Mr. Price, who became executive news editor of the AP on January 1, 1937, is on a national tour, visiting AP bureaus and newspaper offices.

"The Associated Press," he said, "works toward production of news that is accurate, reliable, informative and entertaining, supplied as speedily as accuracy permits. Newspaper success is built on a foundation of public confidence and cultivation of public confidence for the papers is one of our big jobs."

Van Antwerp May Head VFW Group

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 25.—(AP)—Major Eugene I. Van Antwerp of Detroit was nominated today without opposition to succeed Scott P. Squyres of Oklahoma City as national commander of the veterans of foreign wars. Van Antwerp is now senior vice commander, an officer whose elevation to commander is customary.

Delegates adopted a resolution urging congress to appropriate funds for counter-espionage activity. The resolution expressed belief the government did not have sufficient personnel or equipment to cope with "foreign spies who are operating in this country."
