Charge Murder To Hitchhikers

Adventure-Seeking Women Accuse Each Other of Farmer's Death

FAIRFIELD, ILL., Aug. 26.—(P)—A country sheriff cleverly paired two young women hitchhikers against each other in obtaining mutual accusations today of complicity of slaying Felix Shannon, 56-year-old Mount Erie, Ill., farmer.

Sheriff Ernest Burkett said the women—tall, slender Jean Brooks, whose dyed red hair is fading to its natural brown, and blonde, buxom Beulah Honeycutt—blamed each other for the shots that killed Shannon as he lay in bed Sunday night.

The women, both of whom are married, left their Tennessee mountain homes several weeks ago to seek adventure on the road. Mrs. Brooks, 23, lives in Elizabethton, Tenn., and Mrs. Honeycutt, 25, in Johnson City, Tenn.

Shannon's 6-year-old son, Carlye, identified them as the hitchhikers who picked up Sunday morning and left at a tavern in Oakland City, Ind., where he took the boy to his mother's home in Somerville, Ind. The Shannons are divorced.

On his return trip, Burkett said, Shannon stopped for the women and brought them to his farm home.

"I was in another room," the sheriff quoted Mrs. Brooks as saying, "when I heard two shots. I went into the bedroom and there was Beulah. She handed me the gun and said, 'here you fire one so you can't squeal on me.' I closed my eyes and fired one shot, past his head into the pillow."

Mrs. Honeycutt, in turn, charged her companion fired the first, and fatal shots, the sheriff reported. The farmer was slain with his own gun, which was found beside his automobile, abandoned in a ditch, a mile from his home.

The motive for the slaying was obscure, Burkett said, although he learned the women had been told Shannon was "good pickings and had a lot of money."

Drug Warehouses Close in Dispute

110 Warehouses in Bay District Now Shut Over "Hot Car"

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 26.—(P)—The immediate closing of all wholesale drug warehouses was announced tonight by the Association of San Francisco Distributors as its "hot cargo" dispute with CIO warehousemen spread through 110 warehouses of various sorts in the San Francisco bay district.

The drug branch of the industry was affected for the first time in the three-week-old controversy when the roving, picketed freight car, bone of contention in the labor strife, was shunted to two big drug houses—Coffin-Redington and McKesson and Robbins.

Twenty-five liquor houses were closed here at 5 p. m., and five in Oakland. The lineup tonight showed 25 public warehouses, 38 wholesale grocery plants, 30 liquor warehouses, four hardware houses, 12 drug concerns and the F. W. Woolworth warehouse closed.

The wandering freight car was scheduled to make its next invasion in the dry goods industry. CIO union warehousemen have refused to unload the car, contending it was loaded with school supplies by "strike breakers" at the Woolworth plant.

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Rock Contract Worries Court

Believe no Requirement for Furnishing Rock for Oiling Job

A question of supplying approximately \$50 worth of quarry material for the North Santiam highway oiling contract caused county court members late yesterday to dig into the files to read their original contract with the federal bureau of public roads.

They declared they didn't believe the contract required them to furnish any rock for the surfacing job.

Judge Siegmund, who with County Engineer N. C. Hubbs inspected the highway work yesterday, said he believed the court must provide right-of-way at least to the source of the rock wanted, in a pit above Detroit.

Since the pit, long used by the county without cost, has been sold to private owners by the Hammond Lumber company, the county might find it wise to pay the present owner a small sum for the material needed, 1000 to 1500 yards, needed for filling purposes.

The judge said he found the upper highway "in the finest condition I ever saw," and Hubbs said the county's section of the road, below Detroit, was also in the best condition it had ever been, better than last year.

With 11 of the 17 miles to be oiled already completed as to base rock, the stretch will be finished and ready for surfacing next week, Hubbs reported. If there is no rain, the oil-surfacing can be completed in two weeks, he predicted. The job is being done by the Milne Construction company.

No Interest Seen In New Courthouse

County Court not to ask Another Opinion From Attorney General

The county court has little notion of putting a measure on the November general election ballot authorizing construction of a new courthouse and probably will not ask the attorney general for his opinion as to possible ways to proceed, Commissioner Roy S. Melson and Judge J. C. Siegmund indicated informally yesterday.

Melson declared the attorney general a year ago outlined necessary procedure to the court and said he believed the court would not be inclined to attempt to "force a new courthouse down the people's throats."

"There has been scarcely a person in to talk to us about a new courthouse or an election," Melson said. "If there is any interest in it, we haven't heard of it."

The court dropped plans to put a courthouse measure on the ballot when the PWA recently rescinded the \$266,404 grant allocated to the project. September 8 is the latest the court could issue a check for election call to coincide with the general election date.

Prohibition Seen Facing America

PORTLAND, Aug. 26.—(P)—The United States may face with a return to prohibition, Louis B. Montfort, New York, declared at the closing session of the National Alcoholic Beverage Control association today.

Montfort, counsel for the Finger Lake Wine Growers' association, said the prohibition return movement was "a permanent, well-directed movement."

"I feel that unless the alcoholic beverage industries clean their own houses, they are definitely going to be faced with repeal of some sort or other or varying restrictive legislative action, not only on the part of the federal government but also on the part of the various state and smaller jurisdictions," Montfort said.

Rooster Mourns Near Grave of Terrier Friend

RICHMOND, Va., Aug. 26.—(P)—Why ten-week-old Rhod Island Red rooster should mourn four days at the grave of his Scotch terrier pal was a baffling question to two poultry experts who watched the unusual barnyard drama.

Mrs. Margaret Kaighn's Scotty was killed by an automobile Tuesday after holding a tug-of-war over an angleworm with the rooster. The dog was buried the same day.

The rooster soon found the grave and sat down on it. Each day he has squatted there until Mrs. Kaighn put him on the roost at dusk.
