

First Carload of Corn Goes

30 Tons Shipped; Demand Good, Growers Paid \$22 Ton or More

JEFFERSON—The first carload of green sweet corn ever to be shipped from Jefferson was shipped from the local depot recently. This car contained 567 five dozen cases or about 30 tons of corn. It was the first carload of fresh produce to be shipped east by Phillips & Stone, local packers. Another car was shipped from here this week.

The packers are paying the growers from \$22 to \$25 a ton. They say that they have a good demand and could move an unlimited amount of corn. The crop this season is light, and shipment will run to only a few cars.

Phillips & Stone have also shipped Bermuda onions from this district, and report much success for the first year of the packing concern. The growers realized a good profit on the small acreage they had planted. The demand was more than the growers could supply, and next year they hope to contract many more acres than they had this year. They paid the growers 90 cents a bushel, net.

Eastman Speaks
There was a fair size audience Wednesday night, with Jack Tyson, president, presiding. Following the business session, Elbert was introduced, and he explained the Citizens' Retirement Annuity bill, which in brief is as follows: That the state of Oregon will pay all old people over 65 years of age a pension of \$10 a month, or from \$40 to \$75 per month at age 65 with the provision that the elderly people cease all gainful pursuits and spend the money in Oregon each month.

He also stated that it is not a sales tax; the tax does not pyramid; it will not hinder Oregon business; no new offices will be created as the pensions will be handled by the state treasurer's office; wages will not be taxed.

Traveling Kitchen to Be of Interest; Wills Will Broadcast

MONMOUTH—Interest of the local calendar centers this week on the Polk county fair occurring September 1 and 2. In addition to the many 4-H club and community booth entries are a number of features of special distinction. One is the display of a modern kitchen, designed to meet the needs of an Oregon farm family.

A tool-drawer for father; a built-in desk for household and farm business; and a play-board for children's kitchen toys are among the listed items. Mrs. Virginia Schneider will demonstrate the kitchen.

The plan, design and construction of the kitchen was achieved through cooperation of the agricultural extension service, home economics department, and agricultural engineering departments of Oregon State college.

W. C. Leth, Polk county agent, explains that the kitchen is a travel unit making a circuit of Oregon, and will be available for display here only on September 2. It will be of special interest to men as well as women. In the summer of 1937 this kitchen demonstration was exhibited in 12 counties and its demonstrations were attended by 19,244 men and women.
