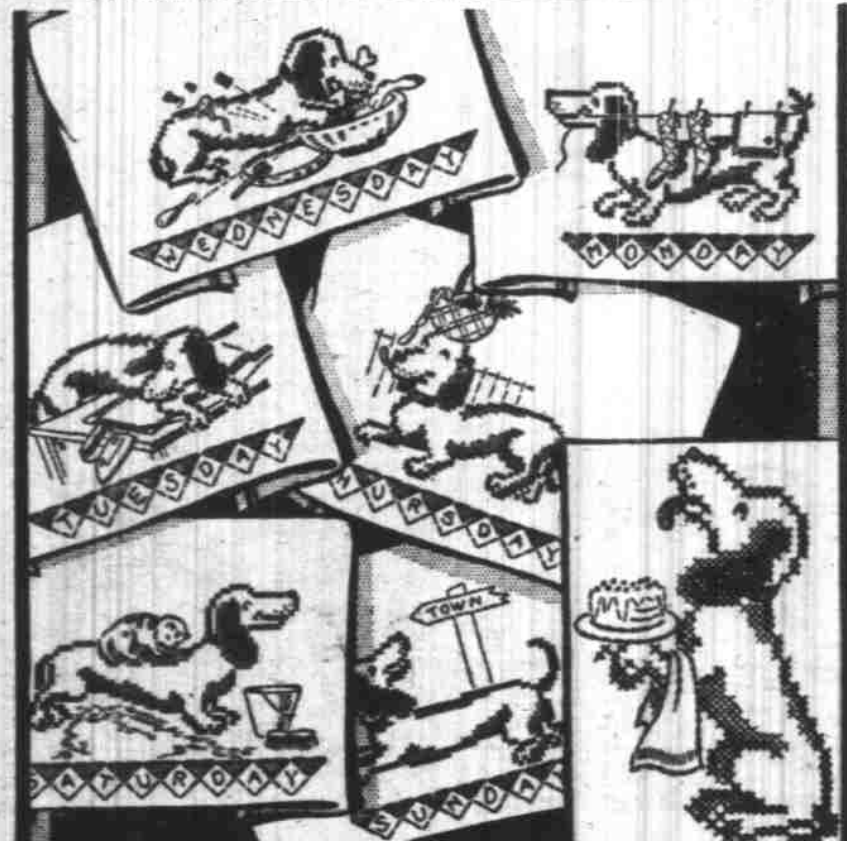

Art Center NOTES

Noted over the country for the excellence of interior design, Timberline Lodge is represented in the current exhibitions at the Salem Art Center, with a wide and varied showing of arts and crafts representative of all the interior. All of the work was done by various works progress administration projects. The story of Mt. Hood and Timberline is told in the following article by E. J. Griffith, state administrator:

Sighted first by Lieutenant Broughton in 1792 and named for Admiral Hood of the British navy, its aloof beauty admired as a landmark by Lewis and Clark, feared by fur-traders and avoided by the earliest immigrants who passed down the treacherous Columbia on horses rather than its dangers, Mount Hood has figured largely in the annals of Oregon.

As the Oregon commonwealth grew, improved roads and easy transportation drew thousands of persons to Mount Hood. Skiing, hiking annually drew thousands, mountain climbing, coasting, and to its snowy slopes. When the mountain came under the control of the United States Forest Service, summer home sites and many points of interest were made accessible. Although accommodations for crowds were inadequate, popular interest made the Mount Hood recreational area the most heavily patronized area of its kind in the United States.

Winter sports were organized and competitions arranged, one of the most popular being the June snow sports during the annual Rose Festival. Forest service officials, as well as civic-minded persons in Portland and throughout Oregon, began to consider means of providing for visitors. In cooperation with the Works Progress Administration, the forest service and a group of Portlanders worked out a plan in which Timberline Lodge, federally owned and controlled but privately operated, would be the center of a recreational area project that would include not only hotel accommodation, but the development of trails, ski and toboggan courses, outdoor theater facilities, reflecting pools and Alpine floral areas.

The construction of Timberline Lodge has required the greatest variety of labor, from the unskilled to the highest professional, of any project in Oregon if not in the United States. Research workers from the Writer's Project furnished basic material upon which architects based their designs. Artists and artisans were employed in every capacity from weaving the fabrics used in furnishings to carving the novel posts on the stairs. Scarcely a stone or a timber used in lodge construction but bears the stamp of writer, artist, wood-carver, wrought-iron craftsman or other workers employed on one of the many WPA projects. Since its completion, musicians and actors have also contributed to Timberline Lodge, and all other projects, coordinating their efforts, have made it the concrete manifestation of the highest significance of a new and evolving social order.

The exhibition opens this afternoon at the Art Center for three weeks.
