Castuera Goal Of Loyal Army

20 Miles of Rebel's Lines Threatened by Drive of Government

HENDAYE, France. (As the Spanish Frontier), Aug. 29.—(AP)—Spanish government troops were reported today to be closing in on Castuera, insurgent base 150 miles airline southwest of Madrid, and threatening to cut off 20 miles of the enemy lines. Counter-attacking against the insurgent threat to drive east for the valuable Almaden mercury mines, the militiamen struck from the north along the Villanueva de la Serena and Compañario sectors.

Break Left Flank Government dispatches said these troops broke through the left flank of the enemy and occupied numerous positions around Castuera.

They also asserted the main road running east from Castuera to Cabeza del Buey, 20 miles away on the route to Almaden, had been cut, although secondary lines apparently remained intact.

Insurgent advances acknowledged that Generalissimo Francisco Franco's legions had taken the defensive in the Castuera sector but asserted governmental assaults had been checked. Dispatches from both government and insurgent sides indicated the battle in the lower Ebro valley, in eastern Spain, was slackening with exhausted troops resting after a month's struggle which left the government in possession of its gains on the west bank of the river.

Cobb to Attempt Cracking Record

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Balked by rain, John Cobb, bulky and genial London broker, set out tomorrow for his attempt to break the three-day-old world's land speed record of 245.49 miles per hour set by his compatriot, Capt. George E. T. Eyston.

Cobb was to have gunned his low slung automobile down the 13-mile salt course this morning but a thunderstorm that broke after midnight made the going too treacherous.

Wagner Hears AFL Complaint

Executive Council Relates Grievances to Author of Labor Bill

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Senator Robert F. Wagner (D, N. Y.), author of the Wagner act, carried with him tonight on his way to a White House visit tomorrow complaints of American Federation of Labor leaders that the labor relations board was "destroying the sacredness" of union contracts.

President William Green of the AFL and members of its executive council related to Wagner for two hours late today their accumulated grievances against the board and its decisions under the Wagner act involving AFL unions.

Has Little to Say Wagner emerged from the conference with little to say except that he had been invited to the quarterly meeting of the council to hear "what they regard as complaints about the disposition of some cases involving American Federation of Labor interests."

Green told news reporters the council had urged Wagner to study details of the complaints the AFL was making in about 20 cases.

"We submitted to Senator Wagner details of the maladministration of the act by the national labor relations board," Green said.

"We gave him concrete evidence of our charge that the board is biased in administering the act and pro-CIO in its decisions. We presented evidence and facts showing where contracts have been invalidated and set aside by decisions of the board."

Support Pledged Highway Request

MARSHFIELD, Aug. 29.—(AP)—"Sympathetic support" was pledged the Roseburg chamber of commerce's request for early reconstruction of the Pacific highway between Roseburg and Grants Pass by the Oregon Coast Highway association.

The chamber recommended the highway board issue bonds to finance straightening the route and also to realign the Columbia river highway. The commission, however, declined to consider the proposal.

Motorcycle, Deer Collide on Road

ASTORIA, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Bernard Swenson of Olney and his nine-year-old son Robert were motorcycling near here Sunday when a deer bolted in front of their machine.

The boy was catapulted over the animal and suffered severe cuts and bruises. The cycle was badly damaged but apparently the deer was uninjured for it fled into the woods.

Guards Surround Home of Bakers

Kidnap-Beating Victim's Children Threatened in 2d Missive

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 29.—(AP)—The home of Irving Baker, victim of Olympia's society-stirring kidnap-assault case, was guarded tonight after Prosecutor Smith Troy revealed a second note threatened harm to Baker's children unless he drops the case.

Dr. Kent W. Berry, Olympia physician; James Reddick, Olympia taxi driver; William K. McAloon, former Montesano marshal, and Robert Smith, Brady, Wash., dairyman, were given until Wednesday to plead to first degree kidnaping and assault charges. Harold Schars, deputy coroner here, pleaded innocent to being an accessory to harboring Smith and McAloon, and his \$25,000 bail was reduced to \$2,500 and he was released.

Troy said today's note, delivered at the Baker home in the morning mail, was penciled on feminine stationery, mailed last midnight and said:

"This is your last warning. Follow orders of the last note or else!"

The first note, contrived from words clipped from newspapers and magazines, and pasted on foolscap, was reported thrown through a front window of the Baker bungalow Saturday night.

Mrs. Jack Oakie Is Given Divorce

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 29.—(AP)—At home, partly Jack Oakie of the films liked to argue, Venita Varden Oakie testified today in support of her complaint for an interlocutory decree of divorce, which she won without contest in superior court.

Mrs. Oakie said she tried to make a good home for her husband, but his "abusive conduct" made her so "terribly nervous" she was twice forced to go to a hospital to recover.

Albany Educator Taken by Death

ALBANY, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Dr. Daniel Freeman, 74, professor of biology at Albany college for 15 years, died at his home today. An educator all his life, Dr. Freeman was graduated from Earlham college, Richmond, Ind., and obtained his doctor of philosophy degree from the University of California.

Surviving are his widow and four daughters.

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
