Chamber Is Told Of FHA Interest

Erroneous Belief Current in Regard to Interest, Says FHA Official

Erroneous beliefs regarding the actual amount of interest and other charges involved in loans made possible by the federal housing administration were discussed by Joseph A. Nance, assistant production manager of the FHA for Oregon, in an address at the Salem chamber of commerce luncheon Monday noon.

Under title I, partially insured credit and character loans for construction or repair of buildings or for purchase of appliances which become a permanent part of the property, the maximum interest charge is 6 per cent of the original loan for a year, but the loan is gradually curtailed after 60 days, so that the interest actually amounts to about 9.7 per cent, Nance explained.

Under title II, insured mortgages on residential properties of which the borrower must be the occupant, the interest charge is 5 1/2 per cent on unpaid balances and that is the actual interest paid, Nance pointed out. These loans may amount to as much as 90 per cent of the value of the property, with certain restrictions, and the borrower has 25 years in which to pay. The act also provides for 60 per cent loans on older buildings.

Nance was introduced by J. F. Ulrich, Salem realtor.

Postoffice Walks Are Reconstructed

Reconstruction of the Church street sidewalk along the postoffice block is well under way, with Floyd Moser of Silverton the contractor. The sidewalk project also includes addition of a two-foot parking along Church so patrons will not have to walk in the mud during the winter and a cement fill at the west street entrance to the postoffice.

Less Relief Help Seen From Liquor

Oregon Sales Receipts to Decrease as 'Saturation Point' Is Reached

Receipts from liquor sales in Oregon probably will decrease rather than increase, Arthur McMahon, chairman of the state liquor control commission, declared here Monday.

McMahon's remark was made during a conference of members of the state liquor control commission, state relief committee and Governor Charles H. Martin to estimate how much liquor money would be available for relief during the remainder of 1938.

July Down \$65,000—"It is my opinion that the liquor saturation point in Oregon has been reached," McMahon said at the close of the conference. He said unsatisfactory business conditions also might contribute to lower sales.

During the past two years approximately \$2,500,000 of state liquor funds were turned over to the relief committee annually.

Traveling Kitchen To Be Fair Feature

Buildings and new Color Are Highlights of Display Sept. 5 to 11

Mrs. Virginia Schneider, assistant in the home economics extension service of Oregon State college, is in charge of the traveling kitchen demonstration which will be on display here at the Oregon State fair, September 5 to 11.

This modern kitchen on wheels has many valuable suggestions on construction of built-ins and kitchen arrangement for families who are planning to build and remodel. Suggestions are also given for rearranging kitchen equipment in order to make the farm kitchen more convenient.

Features Built-Ins—Some of the features of the built-ins of this modern kitchen consist of a floor-to-ceiling cabinet for the storage of packed groceries and cooking utensils, a specially designed wood box, a cabinet for the storage of farm records and bulletins, and a play cabinet for the children.

An interesting and new color treatment has been used throughout in the finishing of the walls, woodwork and accessories.

The kitchen will be exhibited in 14 counties in Oregon in the summer and fall of 1938. Marion county's only showing of the kitchen will be at the state fair. Local arrangements for the traveling kitchen display are in charge of County Agent Harry L. Riches.

R. C. Davis Estate Valued at \$55,115

Canby Project Cost \$522,000

Annual Assessment of \$6 Acre Estimated Need for Gravity Setup

The cost of constructing a gravity system for the Canby irrigation project was estimated at \$522,000, which would require an annual assessment for operation, maintenance and debt payment of between \$5.50 and \$6 an acre, a report of the United States bureau of reclamation received here Monday revealed.

The district would comprise approximately 3695 acres. Estimates were prepared for the irrigation of lands by means of two pumping units. One of these units includes the area north and west of Canby and involves the irrigation of 1195 acres which would be irrigated by means of a pumping plant to be located on the Molalla river at Knights bridge.

Works' Cost \$173,000—The estimated cost of constructing works for the irrigation of lands in this unit was \$173,000 or \$145 per acre. The assessment which would be required to retire this indebtedness over a 40-year period without interest would amount to \$3.65 an acre.

The total annual charge for operation and maintenance, including purchase of electrical energy and repayment of construction costs, would depend on the cost of electrical energy, the report read. If electrical energy could be purchased at four mills per kilowatt hour, the annual charge was estimated at \$7.65 per acre.

The second pumping unit provides for the irrigation of 1445 acres of land lying southeast of Canby which would be irrigated by means of a pumping plant on the Molalla river a short distance above the Pacific highway bridge near Canby.

225 Farms in District—The estimated cost of constructing an irrigation system for this area is \$69,200 or \$60.50 per acre, which distributed over a 40-year repayment period without interest would require an annual assessment of \$1.50 an acre. If power was purchased at four mills per kilowatt hour, the estimated annual payment would be \$5.50 per acre.

There are 225 farms in the Canby project with an average holding of 16 acres.
