

### School Bond Vote Saturday

Riverview District Negative on Proposal for new Instructor

LEBANON — Sweet Home will hold a bonding election September 3 to vote bonds to refinance a new \$12,700 school building made necessary by many new residents in the district. A PWA grant for \$9900 has been approved. The present building was planned to house 175 pupils and the enrollment last year was near 275, making the quarters so crowded that part of the time two teachers used the same room, one in the forenoon and one in the afternoon.

Vote Down New Teacher County School Superintendent J. M. Bennett reports that Riverview district north of Crabtree voted down a tax to employ a new teacher, the vote being 13 to 13 on a measure requiring a majority.

An advisory vote previously recorded 19 to 14 in favor of a new teacher, but was voted by both taxpayers and non-taxpayers.

### 2 Bond Elections Face Scio Voters

SCIO—Friday, September 2, Scio citizens will vote on the city council's proposal to issue \$12,000 in bonds for improvements and reconstruction of the city water system. The proposal contemplates a PWA grant of \$2,000 to augment the bond issue. Polls will be open at the city hall from 2 to 8 p. m.

Tuesday, September 6, the legal voters of Scio school district are to voice their sentiment of the proposal to issue bonds for \$10,400 to erect and furnish a new school building. Polls will be open at the city hall from 2 to 7 p. m.

The present frame school building, in use since 1895, is said to be antiquated and inadequate for present needs, and to be fast approaching condemnation by the state board of education.
