It was "long-shot" day at the state fair horse races Friday, and the outsiders came through in flying fashion, three of them returning the fancy price to backers of \$72.50, \$84.00 and \$23.58.

The event also produced the prettiest bit of running on the part of any single horse. Propel was left at the barrier by a good 30 yards, but came right through the pack with a finishing spurt that pulled him up to third.

25 to 1 Shot Wins
Second best price of the day was reserved until the final event, a mile and 1/16 thriller, in which Blind Chatters, a 25-1 shot, and Sir Satin, the favorite, fought it out the full last mile, never more than a half-length apart.

Heading into Saturday's final day of racing, Jockey Johnny Boucher retained his margin over Howard Conley for the most "money" rides of the meet. Each rode home two winners today, to leave the total standing 63 to 56.

Four Ace Tennis Experts Show Form as Field Drops to 32

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 9.—(AP)—The four top-ranking stars, who performed before a crowd of 8,000 today in the men's and women's national singles tennis championships, set such glittering examples to the rest of the field that the entry was reduced to 32 survivors in each division without a single major disaster.

Among them this high-powered quartet lost seven games in ten sets. Budge beat 17-year-old Welshman Van Horn of Los Angeles, 6-0, 6-0, 6-1; Bromwich eliminated rangy Gus Ganszmann of Seaciff, Mass., 6-1, 6-0, 6-1; Miss Marble, champion in 1936 and No. 1 in national ranking, beat Mrs. Catherine Sample of Miami, Fla., 6-1, 6-0, and "Ja-Ja" runner-up a year ago to Anita Lizana of Chile, dusted off Elizabeth Blackman of Detroit, 6-0, 6-3.

Budge, playing his opening match after drawing a first-round bye, didn't draw a deep breath and didn't come into the forecourt more than half a dozen times in whipping the ears off Van Horn, a promising 16-year-old junior who had been expected to make a better showing.

Detroit Lions Win Opening Pro Game
DETROIT, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Scoring all of their points in the first half, the Detroit Lions conquered the Pittsburgh Pirates, 16 to 7, tonight in the opening game of the National Professional Football league season.

Byron (Whizzer) White, former Colorado university star who signed for a season's play with the Pirates for a reported salary of \$15,000, retained his team's only touchdown on a plunge from the two yard line late in the final period. Earl (Dutch) Clark, Detroit quarterback and coach, remained on side lines throughout the game because of an ankle injury.

Wires Late, Werber Plays
BOSTON, Sept. 9.—(AP)—A delay in the delivery of three telegrams concerning Bill Werber's three-day suspension today enabled the Athletics' fiery third baseman to play against the Red Sox and beat them, 4-3, with a two-run homer.

Werber has been sidelined for three days by President Will Harbridge for his part in yesterday's fisticuffing with Buddy Myer of the Senators. Harbridge's wires, however, were not received until after the game.

Although Werber, whose bat accounted for half of the Athletics' winning four-run rally in the eighth, was officially ineligible, the Red Sox management said no protest would be made and that the game as far as the Boston club was concerned, would stand as a Philadelphia victory.
