New TB Hospital Operation Talked

Higher Education Board Would Administer It Under Proposal

A contractual agreement, for operation of the new state tuberculosis hospital to be erected in Portland, was discussed by members of the state board of higher education and State Treasurer Holman, representing the board of control, Monday.

The board of higher education, through the University of Oregon medical school unit, would assume responsibility for administration and operation of the new tuberculosis hospital, within the limitations of legislative appropriations.

The budget would be prepared by the board of higher education, separate from its other activities.

To Training School
The board of higher education would be responsible to the state board of control for conduct of the institution.

Facilities of the hospital would be available to its other activities.

The new hospital will cost \$200,000, of which \$110,000 was appropriated by the state. The additional \$90,000 was allocated by the federal government.

Selection Unmade For Relief Chief

Routine case studies kept the Marion county relief committee in session all day yesterday but no selection was given to selection of a successor to Glenn C. Niles, executive secretary, who recently resigned as of October 1. Niles is still in a hospital at Portland.

A personnel committee, to deal with matters other than the secretaryship, was named by Rev. George H. Swift, chairman of the general committee. It consists of H. V. Collins, chairman, County Commissioner Roy S. Nelson and Rev. Swift.

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Health Group Charts Drive

Mrs. Glenn Seeley Heads Christmas Seal Sale Through Mails

Several appointments were announced at the meeting of the executive board of the Marion County Health department held Monday. Mrs. Glenn Seeley was named mail sales chairman for Christmas seals. She is chairman of the community service department of the American Legion auxiliary.

Mrs. Dwight Lear will adapt a national program called "Christmas in the Home" for use in the health education classes of the public schools. The Christmas seal campaign, under the direction of Tommy Hoxie, will begin with a kick-off dinner the Monday before Thanksgiving and plans were outlined by Hoxie for an intensive campaign this year.

Leave Granted
Mrs. George R. K. Moorhead, it was announced, would be granted a partial leave of absence during September and October and a proportionate cut in salary from her duties as executive secretary of the Marion County Health association.

It was also announced that the plans for the new court house provide enlarged quarters for the association and would mean a substantial saving in rent for the department.

A program for rehabilitation of tubercular patients is being undertaken by the association. Already the first contact has been made for art instruction at the State Tuberculosis hospital twice a week. The instructor is being furnished by the Salem Federal Art center. Handicrafts are expected to be taught later if sufficient interest is shown and secretarial and stenographic instruction will still later be arranged for if possible.

Last year's tuberculosis deaths in the county were materially lessened and the number of patients treated by the association increased, according to statistics.

Club Will Choose Delegates Tonight

Members of the Marion County Republican club will meet tonight to select 13 delegates to the state Republican club convention to be held here Friday and Saturday of this week. Robert E. Jones, president of the local chapter, said last night.

Tonight's meeting is scheduled at 7:30 p. m. at the Marion hotel, Jones said.

Among local members assisting with the convention are Jones, who will be chairman of the registration and information committee; Dr. P. O. Riley, program chairman; Ken Dalton, convention booster chairman; Ernest Miller, finance chairman and Hugh Scott, publicity chairman. Mrs. George R. K. Moorhead is in charge of ticket sales for the convention banquet and dance at the Marion hotel Friday night. This affair will be open to the public.

Address Changes Must Be Listed

Immediate notification of change of address was urged upon claimants of unemployment compensation by officials Monday. They said this would avoid delay in delivery of benefit checks.

Notice to the post office of change of address will not suffice as postal authorities have been requested not to forward benefit checks.

Claimants are expected to check addresses on each call at employment offices, but in cases where change of address occurs several days before the regular weekly reporting date, immediate notification will prevent delays, officials advised.

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
