

Budgets Filed By Institutions

11 State Agencies Asking \$6,157,184 for Coming Biennium's Expenses

Budget requests filed by the 11 state institutions for the 1939-40 biennium total \$6,157,184.56, as compared to \$3,810,794.82 appropriated for the 1937-38 biennium. State Budget Director Wallace S. Wharton announced Tuesday.

This is an increase of \$2,436,589.54.

Included in the total requests for the next biennium, starting January 1, 1939, is \$1,645,153 for a building program.

Requests for the 1939-40 biennium, compared with the appropriation for 1937-38 follow:

Salary Requests Rise

Salaries and wages, \$1,920,221.92 requested; \$1,540,087.59 appropriated for 1937-38; \$380,754.62 increase. This increase of 24.7 per cent due primarily to placing the state institutions on a 44-hour week work basis.

General expenses, \$1,172,275.09 requested; \$93,923.30 appropriated for 1937-38; \$23,251.79 increase.

Operating expenses, \$1,783,122.15 requested; \$1,534,647.59 appropriated for the 1937-38 biennium; \$248,447.57 increase.

Maintenance expenses, \$240,107.30 requested; \$171,525.50 appropriated for 1937-38 biennium; increase \$68,582.

Capital outlay, \$901,533.90 requested; \$269,742.34 appropriated for 1937-38 biennium; \$631,841.90 increase.

Special requests, \$1,194,274 requested; \$185,842.34 appropriated for 1937-38 biennium; \$1,008,431.86 increase.

Items for the requested building program will include both capital outlay and special requests.

Oregon state tuberculosis hospital, Salem: \$458,265.05 appropriated for 1937-38; \$594,902.95 requested for 1939-40.

Oregon state hospital: \$1,027,039.62 appropriated for 1937-38; \$1,795,083.97 requested for 1939-40.

Coast Hop Crop To Be Rechecked

Recheck of the estimates of the Oregon - California - Washington hop crops for 1938 will be completed within two weeks, it was announced at the hop control board offices here Tuesday.

As it now stands, preliminary handling certificates have been issued to growers permitting shipments of 1938 hops bought on contracts executed prior to June 14, 1938.

Certificates also have been issued covering a quantity produced by any grower in excess of 50 per cent of that grower's probable salable allotment under the marketing agreement.

Proposed Utility Vote Slated, Wasco

November 8 has been fixed as the date for an election on formation of the proposed northern Wasco county people's utility district, C. E. Stricklin, secretary of the state hydroelectric commission, announced.

Application for the election was received from the Pomona grange of Wasco county last Friday. The district would comprise 444 square miles and include the municipalities of The Dalles, Dufur and Moshier.

Albert Conviction Affirmed in Court

The state supreme court Tuesday upheld the conviction of Morris Albert, charged with receiving stolen property in Multnomah county. The case originally was tried before Circuit Judge Stapleton.

In another opinion the court denied a petition for rehearing in the case of J. W. Maidment, appellant, vs. Edward and Kate Russell, appealed from Gilliam county.

Upper Classes Sign Up Today

Frosh Given Exams

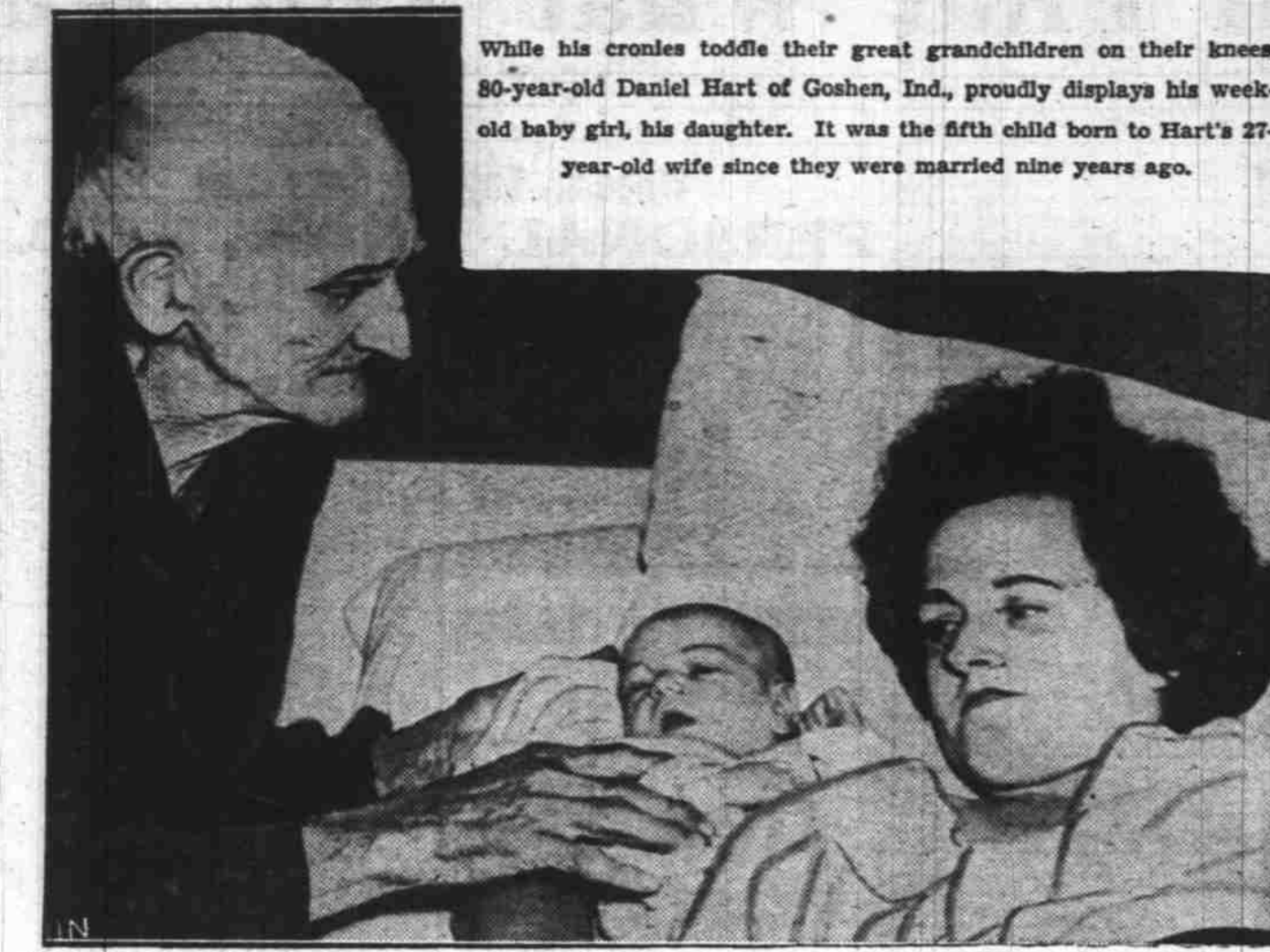
